#### **OPENING:**

Katherine Grogan called the meeting to order at 5:01 p.m. Wanda Spoonmore was not yet present, so there was no inspiration. Katherine decided to skip the music originally planned by Penni Lewis.

#### REPORTS FROM OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES:

- (1) The November minutes were accepted as amended and printed in the newsletter.
- (2) Members shared illness and concerns: Katherine Grogan gave an update on her recent hospital stay. Members were amazed that Katherine managed to lead the meeting despite her hospitalization. Carolyn Power shared that her daughter-in-law has been diagnosed with breast cancer and is scheduled for surgery soon. Carolyn plans to go to Houston shortly to help her daughter-in-law as she recovers and to care for her grandsons. Marylin Nease is currently in Oklahoma with her sister, as her sister is not doing well.
- (3) Leesa Cole, Treasurer, gave the treasurer's report. Delta Omicron's bank balance as of 12/31/2021 was \$3,828.18. Income for Nov. included \$351 for the meeting dinner catered by Jason's Deli. Expenses for Nov. included payment to Jason's Deli for the dinner and reimbursement of Programs Chair. Income for Dec. included \$240 donated to Denton State-supported Living Center, a regular Dec. project. Expenses for Dec. included sending the chapter donations to DSSLC. No new money is budgeted for Jan. unless there are new member dues. Anticipated expense for Jan. includes annual contributions to TSO, International, and ASTEF and any new member dues to TSO and International. Leesa reminded members that dues collection begins in Mar. for the 2022-2023 membership year with final payment due in May, 2022.
- (4) Leesa Cole, Scholarship Chair, discussed several scholarship opportunities. Additional information will be sent to members in the newsletter. (a) Delta Omicron: Members can receive up to \$100 for classes or conferences attended. The deadline for applying is Apr. 1, 2022. A \$150 grant-in-aid is also available for non-member active teachers seeking a Master's degree or PhD. The deadline is Apr. 1, 2022. (b) Dallas County Coordinating Council: The Cora McFarland scholarship is also available with a deadline of Mar. 1,2022. (c) TSO: Our state organization has a scholarship program with a deadline of Mar. 1, 2022. Use this link: TSO Scholarships Info Leesa encouraged members who might be eligible to consider applying.
- (5) Margaret Thompson, 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President for Membership, reported that she will conduct an orientation meeting this Sat. for as well as three other potential members who were unable

- to attend previous orientation meetings.
- **(6) Lou McMillan, Nominations Chair,** stated that the nominations committee has started meeting to discuss nominations for 2022-2024 officers.
- (7) Kay Keeland, Community Service Committee Co-Chair, announced that the tour of West Dallas Community School and luncheon at Celebration restaurant have been cancelled because of the Covid surge.
- (8) Committee reports were temporarily suspended as the meeting's speaker arrived.

#### PROGRAM:

Elenora Asbury, 1st Co-Vice President for Programs and Projects, introduced is president of Dallas Leadership Foundation and a pastoral fellow at Highland Park Presbyterian Church.

Will stated that his organization is a Christian nonprofit founded in 1995. In normal years the organization has 5,000 volunteers, but last year there were only

527 volunteers because of Covid. They work in 12 neighborhoods across Dallas and first ring suburbs. Some of the services this organization does include rental assistance, financial literacy, and leadership development classes. 19,188 people were served by these programs last year. The foundation looks for local leaders who already live in the neighborhoods being served to include in their leadership development classes.

One program is Transform Dallas, which is a joint project with many other well-known churches in the Dallas area. Treasures of Hope is a program in which the first floor of an office building was turned into a store selling holiday gifts at a 75% discount to needy families. Because of Covid challenges, the store was run Amazon-style with parents ordering items online and then driving to the store to pick up their purchases. It served 1,200 individuals.

A significant program is food distribution, which served 917,910 meals. Highland Park Baptist is a big partner in the effort, which started in April of 2021. Packing of meals occurs every Tuesday and Thursday with distribution on Peak Street in Dallas. **The foundation also does a Diaper Drive**, which has distributed 25,000 diapers and wipes to young and new mothers.

There is a re-entry program for prisoners that has been very successful. The foundation started a 232-bed, faith-based dorm at Hutchins State Prison. The men choose to be in the dorm and must be approved by the warden. The program is very popular with both prisoners and guards. The men learn anger management, fatherhood skills, and dressing for work once they are released. As part of the reentry program, there is the Onesimus Transitional Home for released prisoners and workforce development, teaching faith-based leadership training and preparing guys coming out of prison for construction jobs. This program works with national construction companies. Men learn to install cabinets and toilets.

Several programs are directed toward youth: Power Lunch, Power Camp, and Power Study. In Power Lunch, volunteers go to specific schools and work on leadership development and how to handle social media relationships. Students learn how to deal with authority and often are very open to talking with volunteers. Currently, volunteers work in three RISD high schools, Berkner, Richardson, and Lake Highlands, as well as Dallas ISD's Madison High School and Fort Worth ISD's Dunbar High School. Power Camp is a summer program. Kids Across America is a partner in the summer camp. The camp works on career development. This program has been virtual during Covid.

Seeds of Change is a new program, which will start in April 2022 at the Fairmount Hotel. Elenora plans to include further information in the newsletter on how members might help with many of these programs run by the foundation. Members were very impressed by all that the foundation is doing in Dallas.



- (1) Carolyn Power, Global Awareness Chair, stated that more information on DKG International's project Schools for Africa will be discussed in February. She mentioned one specific region in Ethiopia where 48% of the girls are forced to marry as young teens. Parents sell their daughters because they need the money to feed the rest of their family. The girls often ask for help at school. One such school is Shaw Elementary; it is also one of the schools funded by Schools for Africa. DKG trains the teachers on how to stop the practice of marrying girls at a young age.
- (2) Barbara Clinton, Women in the Arts Chair, shared her experiences visiting both Vincent Van Gogh exhibits, one at the Dallas Museum of Art and one in Arlington. The Dallas exhibit is immersive; visitors put on goggles to get the full experience. That exhibit is very entertaining, while the one in Arlington is more about reading the scripts next to the paintings and perhaps more educational. She also mentioned that there is a good exhibit at the Kimball Museum in Fort Worth.

Barbara invited members to share their experiences with art. **Katherine Grogan** mentioned visiting Claude Monet's house and garden in France in the past. **Liza Leggett** continues to hook rugs and do embroidery as well as adult coloring pages to help her deal with stress from Covid. **Margaret Thompson** mentioned visiting the Southwest Art Gallery in Farmers Branch. **Mary Gill** continues to do cross stitch and needlepoint to relax. **Mary Carol Hughes** went to the Christmas display at the



Arboretum and enjoyed it greatly. receives great satisfaction and joy from teaching Special Olympians how to play tennis. **Carolyn Power** shared that her son Ron has a Master's degree in game design. When he was visiting from Washington, D. C., over the holidays, he taught Carolyn's grandsons how to draw Spiderman in three dimensions. Carolyn greatly enjoyed watching Ron and her grandsons as they were making their creations. **Maureen Baker** also went to the Van Gogh exhibit in Arlington. She liked seeing scenes displayed on all four walls of the museum.

Barbara reminded members that both Van Gogh exhibits (in Dallas and in Arlington) close the end of January.

- (3) Mary Carol Hughes, Research Committee member, presented information on five qualities of effective leaders in education. These teachers/leaders (a) are self-aware and prioritize personal development; (b) focus on developing others; (c) encourage strategic thinking, innovation, and action; (d) are ethical and work with others for the common good; and (e) practice effective communication.
- (4) Katherine Grogan tried to give Wanda Spoonmore a chance to share an inspiration, but members were unable to hear Wanda.

Katherine said there were **no additional announcements**.

# **Cora McFarland Scholarship Information History and Purpose:**

The Cora McFarland Scholarship

- was created by the *Dallas County Chapters* of Delta Kappa Gamma Society International to benefit members of chapters within Dallas County and
- is awarded annually to members of the Society to enhance the fulfillment of DKG's fifth purpose, "to endow scholarships to aid outstanding women educators in pursuing graduate study."

#### **Eliaibility:**

#### Long-term scholarship (up to \$3,000) applicants

• must have been a Dallas County DKG member for three full years from date of induction,

**DKG Purpose 5.** To endow scholarships to aid outstanding women educators in pursuing graduate study and to grant fellowships to non-member women educators.

- must be pursuing a doctoral degree, and
- may receive a long-term scholarship once while working toward a doctoral degree.

# Short-term scholarship (up to \$1,000) applicants

- must have been a Dallas County DKG member for at least one full year from date of induction;
- must be working for credit toward
  - an advanced degree,
  - o certification, or
  - o a field-of-study course, workshops, conferences, conventions, or special projects;
- must use the money for these purposes for tuition, fees, and/or supplies (no travel expenses);
- must indicate a direct link between what she is planning to do and who will benefit; and
- may apply for a short-term scholarship no more than twice in a three-year period.

### An applicant for a long-term or a short-term scholarship

- should be an active participant in Delta Kappa Gamma through such things as attendance at chapter meetings, service through committees, elected offices, chapter projects, and attendance at workshops, conferences, and conventions; and
- is expected to remain an active, contributing member of DKG Society International.



**Dr. Jaime Callahan,** who currently represents our chapter on the Cora McFarland Scholarship Committee, shares her experiences with this scholarship. She joined DKG in 2014 and was a scholarship recipient in 2016 and 2017.

- Q. How did you use your two scholarships?
- **A.** I used them to offset tuition costs related to obtaining my doctoral degree.
- Q. What do you want prospective applicants to know about your scholarship experience?

**A.** Having the opportunity to apply for and receive the Cora McFarland scholarships was such a big help as I worked through the process of earning my

doctorate. The path to a doctoral degree is difficult enough without having to worry about cost, and our household decided to pay in full each semester, as opposed to taking out a loan. Having the funds from the Cora McFarland Scholarship made the process a little less stressful.

I highly encourage anyone interested in pursuing higher levels of education or experience to apply for the Cora McFarland Scholarship. The interview process was pleasant and gave the scholarship committee a chance to get to know me and I to know them. They were delightful and supportive and made the entire process easy! I hope our members consider applying this year!

I also urge our members to consider contributing to the Cora McFarland Scholarship Fund so that more scholarships can be awarded. The donation form is attached to this email.

#### SISTERS IN ORANGE AND RED, NOVEMBER 28, 2021

"Want to wear an Oklahoma State Cowboys T-shirt for the Bedlam game?" I asked my sister while searching for the best candidate among her OSU shirts.

"I already have this on," she answered, pulling at the front of her blue T-shirt and apparently not interested in wearing her favorite university's shirt.

"Look, I'm wearing my Oklahoma Sooners shirt." I tugged at my OU shirt to show her the red of her archrival. "Don't you want to wear OSU orange? Bedlam's the biggest in-state game every year for an OU fan like me and an OSU fan like you."

We went back and forth several times, with my sister rebuffing my attempts at persuasion. I was her weekend caregiver and wanted to use our being fans of opposing teams to make our day fun.

Finally, we compromised, and I helped her don orange over today's blue she'd preferred.

"For fun, let's take photos in our shirts," I urged. "Then, we'll get the TV on the right channel, okay?" Linda agreed, and we made our way from her bedroom, through her dining room, down the ramp to the lower level of her home, and into the sunroom. She rode her electric scooter, and I followed.

"Let's sit here to take our pictures," I suggested, pointing to the raised, rocked seating that circles a central fireplace. We sat side by side on the stones, I grabbed my phone and stretched out my left arm to hold the camera before us, we tilted our heads together and smiled, and I took picture after picture trying to capture the perfect photo. "Perfect" meant our eyes were open, we were smiling, the tops of our orange and red shirts were visible, and the two of us were somewhat centered in the shot. After lots of laughter at my unsuccessful efforts, we finally had several shots we liked.

"Now, let's get the TV on," I said.

rode across the room to her recliner, turned off her scooter and dismounted, then settled onto her chair. I sat on the recliner to her right, reached for the remote, and found the channel. Soon, the annual Bedlam game began.

What bedlam it was! First quarter, OSU ahead by 7; halftime, game tied; third quarter, OU ahead by 9. Only in the final seconds did we have a winner: OSU, 37-33. The Cowboys had beaten the Sooners for the first time since 2014.

What fun and I had watching Bedlam together! Much of the game, we sat on the edges of our chairs. Every time the stadium noise increased or I shouted, she asked, "What happened?" I did my best to give play-by-play analysis. At the end, we both cheered for OSU.

Game over, she rode by my chair, stopped, pointed to her OSU shirt, and asked, "Did you get a picture of this?"

Next day, we both wore orange. I took more photos. What fun Bedlam was!

**Mission:** To share our DKG vision, "Leading Women Educators Impacting Education Worldwide," and to strengthen our DKG Society International.

Rationale: Education is a challenging career, and retaining quality teachers is an issue worldwide. According to education policy researcher Richard Ingersoll, the rate in the U.S. of beginning teachers leaving the profession in the first year is a little more than 10%; with 33% leaving by Year 3, and 46% by Year 5. In addition, around 15% of U.S. teachers overall leave the profession each year.
