

Thompson, and Jean Wallace. Mary Gill and Carolyn Power **attended via Zoom. Two guests attended:**

OPENING: Katherine Grogan called the meeting to order at 5:03 p.m.

Wanda Spoonmore **gave the inspiration.** She stated that our greatest glory is not in never falling, but in rising after a fall either to try again or to try something new. She also explained that magic occurs when we believe in ourselves. Simply by believing in ourselves, we can make something positive happen.

Wanda stated that none of us would be in DKG if we had not made something happen in our lives previously.

PROGRAM: EDUCATIONAL EXCELLENCE COMMITTEES presented information on the theme of books and reading.

Penni Lewis, Music Chair, explained that she chose the song "In My Own Little Corner, in My Own Little Chair" from *Cinderella* because that is how we discover books.

Marylin Nease, Research Chair, shared three pieces of research about books and reading. First, in the old days, books were few and far between, but now books are everywhere. In the Eastern World, in the ninth century AD in China, the first full-length books were printed using wooden block printing. In the Western World, in 1452 in Germany, Johann Gutenberg printed the Bible on a printing press with movable metal type. Each copy of the Bible had about 1,300 pages and was bound in 2 volumes. He printed 180 copies in five years. Each Bible weighed 14 pounds. Each page contained 2,500 pieces of type, with each piece set by hand. Before the printing press was invented, books were copied by hand. These handwritten books were so rare and so valuable that they were chained to library walls! Most people couldn't read or write because most people had no access to books. Today, most of us have books all around us in our libraries, bookstores, homes, schools, and churches. Second, Marylin asked the members if they could name the top five most read books in the world of all time. They are as follows: The Holy Bible, The Holy Quran, the Harry Potter series by J.K. Rowling, *The Quotations from Chairman Mao Tse Tung*, and *The Lord of the Rings* trilogy by J.R.R. Tolkien. For the third piece of research, Marylin asked members which book is most often stolen. The answer was the Bible.

Barbara Clinton, Women in the Arts Chair, shared information about Faith Ringgold, a Black artist and author.

Dr. Catherine Donahue, Global Awareness Committee member, commented that she likes that mothers-to-be are often now given books for their new baby at their baby shower, encouraging literacy at a young age. She also expressed concern that Afghan girls can now only go to school until they are 11 and that once they leave school, their books are often taken away from them.

SPEAKER: Elenora Asbury, **First Co-Vice President for Programs and Projects, presented "Literary Ladies.**" First, she **mentioned several good sources for book recommendations**. Bookbubs.com is a source for free Kindle and E books. For lovers of mysteries, look up bookseriesinorder.com. Of course, amazon.com is a great site for reader reviews. Libraries are also great sources of books. We all have different tastes in books. She asked members who they thought was the **best-selling novelist of all time**. The answer is **Agatha Christie**. Then she asked who is the **first and only billionaire author**. The answer is **J.K. Rowling**.

Elenora divided the lists of books into categories. The first category was fiction. Some of the best books were Where the Crawdads Sing by Delia Owens, The House at Riverton by Kate Morton, The Nightingale by Kristin Hannah, The Four Winds also by Kristin Hannah, The Dutch House by Ann Patchett, and The Giver of Stars by Jojo Moyes. The Giver of Stars talks about packhorse librarians in Appalachia. Other authors to consider are Ann Tyler, who wrote The Accidental Tourist, Back When We Were Grownups, and Breathing Lessons; and Lisa See, who wrote The Tea Girl of Hummingbird Lane. Breathing Lessons won a Pultizer Prize. Other authors to try are Ellen Marie Wiseman, Anna Quindlen, Edith Wharton, and Betty Smith. Flannery O'Connor is known for her short stories. Geraldine Brooks, who wrote both fiction and nonfiction, is especially known for Nine Parts of Desire, a Pultizer Prize winning book about Muslim women in the Middle East. The Things We Cannot Say by Kelly Rimmer takes place in Poland during World War II. Marylin Nease recommended The Tall Woman by Wilma

Dykeman, which tells the story of one of the many women who throughout history have cast a long shadow of influence on others in their families and communities. Other books to consider are *The Beantown Girls* by Jane Healey, *The Nature of Fragile Things* by Susan Meitner, *The Girl with the Louding Voice* by Abi Dare, and *The Outsiders*, a young adult book set in Oklahoma, by S.E. Hinton. Hinton won the Margaret Edwards Award from the American Library Association for her contributions in writing for teens.

Next, Elenora shared some of the better books of historical fiction. They are *America's First Daughter* and *My Dear Hamilton* by Laura Kamoie and Stephanie Dray, *Becoming Mrs. Lewis* by Patti Callahan, *News of the World* by Paulette Jiles, and *The Aviator's Wife* by Melanie Benjamin. Other choices are *Clara and Mr. Tiffany* by Susan Vreeland, *What Once was True-The Robinswood Story: Books 1-3* by Jean Grainger, and *The Girl Who Wrote in Silk* by Kelli Estes. *Hamnet* by Maggie O'Ferrell was chosen as one of the ten best books of 2020 by editors of Book Review. Tracy Chevalier wrote *Girl with a Pearl Earring* and *A Single Thread*. *A Single Thread* was written about life in England after World War I. Alice Hoffman wrote *The Marriage of Opposites* and *The Dovekeepers*.

Then, Elenora discussed mystery, suspense, and thrillers. Agatha Christie is very well known for her many works. Other good authors of this category are Donna Leon, Dorothy Sayers, P.D. James, and Heather Vogel Frederick.

Some good writers of romantic comedies are Dorothea Benton Frank, Fannie Flagg, and Jan Karon. Jan Karon worked at an ad agency before becoming a writer.

Last, Elenora shared some excellent biographies and non-fiction works. They include The Daughter of Kundland: A Life Dedicated to Humankind by Widad Akreyi, Divine Restoration and Live for That Day by Christina L. McCracken, Team of Rivals and No Ordinary Time by Doris Kearns Goodwin, and Autism in Heels by Jennifer Cook O'Toole. Autism in Heels is an intimate memoir telling how the author was diagnosed with Asperger's Syndrome at the age of 35, making things make sense for the first time in her life. Katherine Funk wrote Indira: The Life of Indira Gandhi. The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks by Rebecca Skloot tells the story of a poor tobacco farmer whose cells were taken without her knowledge as she was dying. These cells became one of the most important tools in medicine. The cells are still alive today, nearly 60 years after Henrietta died and have contributed to many important advances in medicine. Her family is now suing John Hopkins. Two more books are The Last Castle by Denise Kiernan and The Girl with Seven Names by Hyeonseo Lee. The Last Castle is about the Biltmore Estate and the activities of both the wealthy and dairy families who lived on the estate.

Katherine Grogan gave Elenora a thank-you gift for her presentation, and Kathy Rodriguez personally thanked Elenora for all her hard work on this presentation.

BUSINESS: (1) The September minutes have been approved as printed in the newsletter.

(2) Leesa Cole, Treasurer, gave the treasurer's report. She reported that 62 members have paid their dues. decided not to continue her membership and was dropped from the membership roll. Income in Sept. included dues from one returning member and one reinstated member. A new budget line was created in the budget under fundraising for the \$199.00 collected at the Sept. meeting with the purpose of providing funds for appreciation gifts to outside speakers (gift card or item up to \$25). Programs chair will submit receipt to treasurer; expense is pre-approved by chapter vote. The proposed budget was approved at the Sept. meeting, and detailed financial reports have been submitted to the recording secretary, chapter president, and finance chairs. Expenses incurred in Sept. include dues to international, dues and fees to TSO, chapter donation to Cora McFarland Scholarship Fund, president reimbursement for a Zoom account, and membership chair reimbursement for new member name badges.

Anticipated income for Oct. includes dues from new members and dinner reservations for the

Nov. dinner. Anticipated expenses for Oct. include dues to international and dues and fees to TSO for new members, chapter fee to CCDC, and a check order placed on 10/4/21. The fee to CCDC is on hold as CCDC currently needs to appoint a treasurer.

(3) Margaret Thompson, 2nd Vice President for Membership, introduced as a prospective member. Then, she expressed disappointment that other members had not brought guests to the meeting as originally requested in September. She also stated that an induction ceremony will be held during the Nov. meeting for new members who joined in calendar year 2020-2021.

CURRENT PROJECTS: Vicky Hamilton, Special Committee for Community Service member, reported (for Kay Keeland, committee chair) that a tour is planned for the West Dallas Community School at 10:00 a.m. on Nov. 1, and all members are welcome to come. Wanda Spoonmore is planning a lunch after the tour at Celebration Restaurant at 11:15 a.m. Members need to let Kay Keeland know if they plan to attend the tour and/or the luncheon. Vicky stated that plans are to collect books and/or candy bags for the teachers in Nov. and Dec.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Susan Endicott, Corresponding Secretary, was not present to share member care and concerns, so Katherine Grogan mentioned that both Carolyn Power and Judy Culbertson had knee surgery. stated that she is scheduled for knee surgery soon. Jan Nance stated that she is planning to have surgery for hammertoes soon.

NEW BUSINESS: Katherine Grogan asked for volunteers to participate in the induction ceremony at the Nov. meeting. Liza Leggett and Margaret Arnold volunteered.

She also discussed the meal for the Nov. meeting and asked members to get meal choices to Cindy Dominguez and money for the meal to Leesa by Nov. 3. The gratuity is included in the price.

ADJOURNMENT: Five door prizes were awarded to Delores Bates, Penni Lewis, Kathy Rodriguez, Lou McMillan, Members sang the DKG song. Katherine adjourned the meeting at 6:20 p.m.


FELLOWSHIP COMMITTEE, Kay Keeland (right) and Wanda Spoonmore (left), Co-chairs

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE, by

Chair

The TRS Board of Trustees adopted amendments to the TRS rules for Employment After Retirement (EAR) during the Sept. 16-17 meeting. The rule changes are effective Nov. 1, 2021, and include new limits that provide a standard number of hours or days that a TRS retiree can work in each calendar month. https://www.trs.texas.gov/TRS%20Documents/update-newsletter-oct-2021.pdf

The Texas Legislature passed Senate Bill 8, which authorizes \$286 million in funding for TRS-Care and TRS-Active Care. Approximately 30% of members enrolled on August 2021 have had either a confirmed or suspected diagnosis of Covid-19 since Mar. 2021. TRS-Care has paid out \$83 million in COVID-related

claims. <u>https://trta.org/sb-8-passes-through-texas-legislature-additional-funding-for-trs-care-coming/</u> The TRS Convention will be held in Dallas on Mon., Apr. 11 – Wed., Apr. 13, 2022. Hotel accommodations will be at the Hilton Anatole, 2201 N. Stemmons Freeway. The group rate is \$189 per night (excluding tax) for a single, double, triple, or quad room, and the limit is two rooms per person. YEARBOOK COMMITTEE, by Marylin Nease, Chair



Cora McFarland Scholarship Information

History and Purpose:

The Cora McFarland Scholarship

- was created by the Dallas County Chapters of Delta Kappa Gamma Society International to benefit members of chapters within Dallas County and
- is awarded annually to members of the Society to enhance the fulfillment of DKG's fifth purpose, "to endow scholarships to aid outstanding women educators in pursuing graduate study."

Eligibility:

Long-term scholarship (up to \$3,000) applicants

- must have been a Dallas County DKG member for three full years from date of induction,
- must be pursuing a doctoral degree, and
- may receive a long-term scholarship once while working toward a doctoral degree.

Short-term scholarship (up to \$1,000) applicants

- must have been a Dallas County DKG member for at least one full year from date of induction;
- must be working for credit toward
 - o an advanced degree,
 - \circ certification, or
 - o a field-of-study course, workshops, conferences, conventions, or special projects;
- must use the money for these purposes for tuition, fees, and/or supplies (no travel expenses);
- must indicate a direct link between what she is planning to do and who will benefit; and
- may apply for a short-term scholarship no more than twice in a three-year period.

An applicant for a long-term or a short-term scholarship

- should be an active participant in Delta Kappa Gamma through such things as attendance at chapter meetings, service through committees, elected offices, chapter projects, and attendance at workshops, conferences, and conventions; and
- is expected to remain an active, contributing member of DKG Society International.



Dr. Jaime Callahan, who currently represents our chapter on the Cora McFarland Scholarship Committee, shares her experiences with this scholarship. She joined DKG in 2014 and was a scholarship recipient in 2016 and 2017.

Q. How did you use your two scholarships?

A. I used them to offset tuition costs related to obtaining my doctoral degree.

Q. What do you want prospective applicants to know about your scholarship experience?

A. Having the opportunity to apply for and receive the Cora McFarland scholarships was such a big help as I worked through the process of earning my

doctorate. The path to a doctoral degree is difficult enough without having to worry about cost, and our household decided to pay in full each semester, as opposed to taking out a loan. Having the funds from the Cora McFarland Scholarship made the process a little less stressful.

I highly encourage anyone interested in pursuing higher levels of education or experience to apply for the Cora McFarland Scholarship. The interview process was pleasant and gave the scholarship committee a chance to get to know me and I to know them. They were delightful and supportive and made the entire process easy! I hope our members consider applying this year!

I also urge our members to consider contributing to the Cora McFarland Scholarship Fund so that more scholarships can be awarded. The donation form is attached to this email.

Note: Applications are due Mar. 1, 2022. After applications are received, all applicants must participate in an interview in Mar. 2022. Scholarship recipients will receive their scholarship awards at the Coordinating Council of Dallas County luncheon in Apr. 2022.

Committee responsibilities for the 2022 Lubbock Convention include the reception for 50+ year members and convention workshops related to membership.




