### Delta Omicron, Chapter Meeting Minutes, October 19, 2020

Delta Omicron Chapter, Dallas, Texas, DKG Society International, met on Monday, October 19, 2020, via Zoom. #### **OPENING:**

Katherine Grogan called the meeting to order at 5:14 p.m. Maureen Baker, Personal and Professional Enrichment, shared an **inspiration**, reading some facts about the first women to vote in America. She stated that Native Americans living in a matriarchal society had the right to vote long

before any Europeans arrived. In 1847 Mary Brandt voted because she owned land. Several other women voted in the Seventeenth through the Nineteenth Centuries, but they were the exceptions. The authorities arrested Susan B. Anthony for attempting to vote in the Nineteenth Century. Today's women have reaped the harvest of earlier women's work.

#### **BUSINESS:**

Leesa Cole recommended one change to the **minutes** of the executive board meeting of October 3, 2020. The sentence "They would only need to pay \$25/year" was changed to "They would only need to pay \$27 or \$50/year, depending on when they join" to align with the chapter dues chart. Members approved the minutes as amended.

Leesa Cole, Treasurer, gave the **treasurer's report.** The bank balance as of 9/30/20 was \$5,422.21, although \$717.02 belongs to Area 9. So, the real balance for Delta Omicron is \$4,705.19. Anticipated income for October consists of the balance of one dues payment. Budgeted expenses for October are dues to International and dues and fees to TSO for three members as well as the CCDC Chapter Fee and the CCDC Cora McFarland Scholarship Fee.

Margaret Thompson, Membership Co-Vice President, shared two vacations of members talked about at the fellowship meeting held October 9. Mary Louise Milliorn traveled with her church's choir to Norway and Russia. Judy Caporaletti traveled to Italy to visit numerous relatives, including staying at the home of her aunt's husband. During World War II, Nazis stayed at this house, which the family found frightening.

Membership Co-Vice President, will regularly take attendance at meetings and

send the list to Margie.

Margaret urged members to use the prospect card she sent out. Margaret announced that plans to join Delta Omicron. who participated in the outing to the Dallas Arboretum, also plans to join, but she could not attend the meeting on October 19.

#### **CURRENT PROJECT:**

Kay Keeland, Community Service Projects, could not attend the meeting, so Mary White, committee member, gave the report on progress made for Vogel Alcove School. Members have donated \$300, and Kay and committee members bought supplies for the 30 teachers as well as additional supplies and

cookies for 80 children at the school. Liza Leggett decorated the bags for the teachers. Kay plans to go to the school on October 26 and would welcome any members who want to join her. Mary asked any members planning to go to Vogel Alcove School to contact Kay.

#### **ANNOUNCEMENTS:**

Susan Endicott, Corresponding Secretary, stated that two members have recently had surgery:
had nasal surgery, and Jo Murphy had hip surgery. Jo Murphy is Immediate Past State
President and is a current member for the TSO Executive Committee. Susan sent both cards from the chapter.

Katherine Grogan, President, stated that she has invited Patti Belknap, TSO President, to the November 16 meeting.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

Marylin Nease, Communications and Publicity, expressed concern for the chapter's working teachers. She asked for volunteers who would be willing to be paired up with the working teachers. Marylin suggested that the volunteers might reach out weekly to their working partners. She will send out a list to the chapter members. stated that many teachers conduct hybrid classes and have lots to do. thought gift cards for meals might be a big help. Members are encouraged to email Marylin if interested in this project (Teachers Helping Active Teachers, THAT) so Marylin can share her ideas further.

#### PROGRAM:

Educational Excellence Committee members presented information on the theme of Harvest Moon to lead into the program.

Legislation, did not attend the meeting.

Barbara Clinton, Women in the Arts, showed a PowerPoint of various artists who painted a harvest moon, mostly from the Nineteenth Century. One artist was William McTaggart, who painted the harvest moon in 1899. Bruce Crane painted a scene showing how he thought the surface of the moon might look. Barbara also shared that if a second moon occurs in a fall month, it is called a blue moon. October will have a blue moon October 31.



Marylin Nease, **Research**, shared research she did on harvest moons. The harvest moon is the full moon that occurs closest to the fall equinox. The fall equinox occurred on September 22, 2020, so the harvest moon occurred on October 1. The harvest moon usually rises in the east around sunset and helps farmers see better to harvest their crops. Because the harvest moon originally shows itself near the horizon, it can appear bigger and often has an orange color. The orange color results from people looking through more of the earth's atmosphere when the moon is lower in the sky. added, "The moon rises 50 minutes later each day."

Carolyn Power, **Global Awareness**, researched why so many festivals occur around the time of the harvest moon. The harvest moon appears brighter in the evening, helping farmers finish their chores in the fields. Native Americans in Canada and British people during Medieval times frequently celebrated harvest moon festivals. Countries in the Southern Hemisphere generally do not celebrate the harvest moon like people in the Northern Hemisphere do. Pliny the Elder wrote about the harvest moon in ancient times. If a ring occurs around a harvest moon, it means rain will happen. Benjamin Franklin died in 1790, and the *Farmers' Almanac*, which he inspired, was published first in 1792. The *Farmers' Almanac* still exists and

claims to have 80% accuracy about when to plant crops. In World War II two Nazi submarines landed in America; the sailors claimed they determined when to land based on the *Farmers' Almanac*! Penni Lewis, **Music**, played the chorus of "Harvest Moon."



Elenora Asbury and Kathy Rodriquez, Programs and Projects Co-Vice Presidents, presented a **program of craft ideas** on the theme of Harvest Moon. Elenora encouraged members to investigate Pinterest, which has craft ideas, recipes, fashion, and lots more. People can create boards and pin ideas to boards. She also suggested the Dollar Store as an excellent source for inexpensive craft projects, making it a great place to take children. Elenora explained how to use oil-based sharpies to decorate blank mugs. One also can decorate wine glasses cheaply. Members could use stencils or rubbery letters to decorate pumpkins. If one decorates pumpkins, choose colors besides orange. One idea mentioned was making a gratitude pumpkin by writing what you are grateful for on the side of the pumpkin. Styrofoam pumpkins can be painted, covered with burlap, or stacked one on top of another and put on the mantle. With some help from Kathy Rodriquez, Elenora demonstrated how to **make a pumpkin out** 

of a mega toilet roll and fabric. Members showed their own creations at the end of the demonstration.

Mary Gill showed some of her beautiful **counted cross stitch projects**. She started with kits in the 1960s. One of her nicest creations was made for her first granddaughter and is titled "Be Your Own Kind of Beautiful." Another creation that members enjoyed was a "Happy Everything" picture that had decorations from all the holidays in the year. Mary showed clothing she has decorated with cross stitch as well as a **quilt** showcasing pins from all the places Mary has traveled. She makes all these beautiful things even though she has an essential tremor in her hands!

Liza Leggett has been **quilting** since 1986 and **hooking rugs** since 1991. She showed several beautiful quilts she had made. One was a heart quilt made from remnants from past apartments and dresses. Liza collects antiques, and this hobby started her on hooking rugs to go with her antiques. Liza explained that she stretches the fabric on a frame first and then hooks the rug design from the back. She won first place at the state fair for a purse that she hooked some years ago. Her first rug was from a kit, but now she designs her own creations. She likes to use different textures, and she once traveled to Nova Scotia to learn from an artist there. She has made many quilts for relatives. Liza showed members many of her creations, and the members expressed their admiration for her work.

#### **CLOSING:**

Leesa Cole and Kathy Rodriquez won the **door prizes**. Katherine played "The DKG Song." Katherine then adjourned the meeting at 6:39 p.m.
