Our March 8 program is a presentation from "Texas Trees Foundation."

Texas Trees Foundation statements to start us thinking about trees in the Dallas area...

"The Foundation's strategic approach is based in research-driven data to mitigate the environmental challenges and related public health concerns that trees can alleviate."

> "Economic development in the absence of environmental integrity is not sustainable."

The Foundation sustains a tree-planting initiative for neighborhood parkways and medians, schools, and other public open spaces; a tree-growing facility to assure a healthy supply of trees for the future; and educational programs to teach the importance and benefits of maintaining a healthy urban forest."

One project that "hits close to home" for many of us is the "October 2019 Storm Releaf Initiative." Its goal is "to assist the City of Dallas and its residents [to] recover after the October 2019 tornado that devastated parts of North Dallas," which had 3,000-3,500 trees too damaged to save.

Another project we can relate with is "Cool Schools." TTF describes the project this way: "We Plan. We Plant. We Educate. We Celebrate. Cool Schools connects students and teachers to nature by planting trees and creating fun and engaging outdoor experiential learning areas. These spaces cultivate children's knowledge and awareness of the natural environment."



Q. A favorite teaching moment?

A. When asked to tell others about myself, what goes through my mind is always interesting. I think, well, I'm a daughter, wife, aunt, teacher, friend, lover of books. These are all things that can describe. I've loved being all of the above.

Some of the parts of who I am have been more or better than others at times. Cycles of one's life, I suppose. When I think of my teacher part, I have wonderful memories of children...children who read to me, shared their written word with me,

shared their laughter and love with me.

The year I turned 55, I was diagnosed with breast cancer, and my second-grade class that year saved my life. They were a part of the diagnosis from the start. They heard it all from me and a friend who had survived breast cancer. I continued working through the year. That December, they became the little elves of Christmas and dropped off all sorts of surprises at my home. They loved it, and so did I. I never knew who brought what, but it only made the "game" more fun for all of us.

The day I came to school after losing all my hair..., we all wore hats! We wore them for the rest of the year. I think some of the boys would have shaved their heads, too! One little girl would sit beside me as I read and reach up into my hat just to feel my head!

Children...such wonderful creatures...beautiful, full of laughter and mischief...little packages chock-full of FUN!

So, the part of me that is teacher has many stockings full of memories that I can bring out and laugh and smile with all over again. Even though I'm now retired, I still think of myself often as teacher because the memories from that time of my life are such that I can still feel the love that was given to me. Teacher...a lovely word.

Delta Omicron, Chapter Meeting Minutes, February 15, 2021

Delta Omicron Chapter, Dallas, Texas, Texas State Organization, DKG International, met on Monday, February 15, 2021, 4:30 for fellowship, and 5:00 for program/business meeting, via Zoom.

One guest attended: longtime Ohio friend of Penni Lewis.

OPENING:

Katherine Grogan called the meeting to order at 5:08 p.m. and recorded it so that members unable to attend could view it later. Maureen Baker gave the inspiration.

PROGRAM:



Marylin Nease and Carolyn Power presented a safari-themed, PowerPoint program to inform members about Schools for Africa, DKG's first international project.

Marylin and Carolyn began by donning their safari jackets and hats. Marylin introduced members to useful Swahili phrases so they could begin the safari to Africa, not to photograph or hunt big game, but to learn about the lives of children in 21 sub-Saharan countries where SFA operates. Marylin also introduced members to five guiding questions for their safari.

Carolyn explained to members that while, yes, we in Delta Omicron do focus on supporting children in our Dallas area, such as through the North Texas Food Bank and the Vogel Alcove School, we can also help to educate

children in our global village.

She told members that SFA became DKG's first international project at the 2010 DKG International Convention in Spokane, Washington, when attendees presented the idea, discussed it, and voted approval for the project.

Marylin said that she attended the 2019 DKG International Convention in Asheville, North Carolina, where she met Cathy Daugherty (photo on right), the 2018-2020 DKG International president. Cathy is the only DKG member ever to go to Africa to see our SFA project in action the only one because of the expense to DKG and because of safety issues. Cathy taught Marylin that DKG members send their money to UNICEF USA instead of trying to administer SFA themselves because UNICEF has been working in Africa for over 70 years and already has the manpower and infrastructure in place to successfully administer the program. In other words, UNICEF knows which local leaders to work with so our DKG money is used responsibly. Cathy also presented a PP of her trip to Africa to show that **SFA is making life better** in the 21

countries where it exists.

Carolyn talked about our "guides" in Africa: the **United Nations**, **UNICEF**, and **UNESCO**. She also spoke about the leadership of **Nelson**

Mandela in bringing quality basic education to children in Africa. Mandela's guiding principle was that "Education is every child's right."

Carolyn showed a **map of Africa** with the **names and locations of the 21 SFA countries** indicated. She also shared the **connections of three of our members with Africa**. **Joyanne Burger's grandfather**, Dr. E. R. Kellersberger, was a medical missionary in Belgian Congo, now called Democratic Republic of the Congo. Dr. Kellersberger's patients and other villagers called him Dr. Not Afraid for his work with patients who had leprosy. Second, **Margaret Thompson's son**

Third, **Lou McMillan's son and her daughter-in-law** work with a Christian school in Tanzania. They took Lou to visit the school in 2017.

Then, Carolyn gave **examples of what donations can purchase for children assisted by SFA**. For instance, \$14,000 will build a school, \$1,000 will buy four School-in-a-Box kits with materials for 195 students, \$500 will outfit a school with desks, and so forth. We discussed how these prices compare with the costs of school buildings, teaching materials, and desks here in the Dallas area.

Next, Marylin circled back to the five guiding questions and asked members to respond with answers.

- #1. What is DKG's first international project? Schools for Africa.
- #2. Who are the guides working with SFA? United Nations and UNICEF
- **#3. What are the names of the 21 SFA countries?** Botswana, Burundi, Chad, Cote d'Ivoire, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Eswatini, Ethiopia, Guinea-Bissau, Kenya, Lesotho, Liberia, Madagascar, Malawi, Mauritania, Mozambique, Namibia, Rwanda, Somalia, South Africa, Tanzania, and Uganda
- #4. Who said, "Education is every child's right."? Nelson Mandela



#5. What are some ways our money can help children in the 21 SFA countries? Constructing schools and providing school-in-a-box kits (pic on left), learners' kits, clean water and sanitation facilities, teacher training, school supplies, and so forth.

Finally, Marylin asked, "As we end our African safari, what can we DKG members do to make a difference?" Answer: **Contribute to SFA**—to save lives and futures through educating children in Africa!

Marylin then discussed the **two ways members can contribute by mail**—since we can't meet in person to pass a basket for donations. Marylin said she would email the instructions to members following the meeting. Carolyn

explained that we would like to have a headcount of contributors (not amounts donated) to have an idea of our members' participation in supporting our SFA project.

CURRENT PROJECTS:

Marylin Nease, Communications and Publicity chair, stated that in addition to our **SFA project**, we are encouraging donations to ASTEF during **ASTEF Giving Month**, which is February. Marylin explained ASTEF: it stands for Alpha State Texas Education Fund; was established as a non-profit charity at state convention in 2010; and funds scholarships, leadership, and projects. She named our chapter's past scholarship recipients, Leadership Seminar attendee, and project stipend awards. She encouraged members to apply in the future for a scholarship, Leadership Seminar, and project stipend and gave the deadlines. She showed the donation form and said she would email it to members after the meeting.

BUSINESS:

The members **approved the amended minutes** from the January meeting as printed in the newsletter. Leesa Cole, **treasurer**, was unable to attend. Her report is in the February newsletter.

Margaret Thompson, **Membership** Co-Vice President, urged members to continue recruiting candidates for membership.

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

Susan Endicott, Corresponding Secretary, stated that she had sent a card to Joyanne Burger.

ONGOING BUSINESS:

Marta Finlay and Marylin Nease, THAT members, stated that one new team has been added to our **THAT Project, which is Teachers Helping Active Teachers.** They are Margaret Thompson (encourager) and lvy Lassiter (active teacher).

Carolyn Miller, **Coordinating Council of Dallas County** chair, reminded members that the CCDC luncheon is April 24 at 9:30 at Lakewood Country Club. Dallas County's 14 chapter-presidents will be honored, along with 25- and 50-year members, and a Friend of Education. Cora McFarland Scholarship recipients will be recognized. \$38 reservations are due to Leesa Cole by March 30.



NEW BUSINESS:

Marylin Nease, Communications and Publicity chair, explained our new initiative: **Connection Circles**. Each circle will have five members, and each member will make one phone call, text, or email a week to a designated member of her circle to get better acquainted, make a wellness check, and pass along chapter updates.

EDUCATIONAL EXCELLENCE COMMITTEES, MORE ON THE PROGRAM'S "GIVING MONTH" THEME:

Carolyn Power, **Global Awareness**, displayed and discussed a document to inform members that the money they donate goes directly to SFA, not to other UNICEF endeavors.

Mary Carol Hughes, **Research**, said **(1)** December is most often the "giving month," according to Google. February is ASTEF Giving Month. **(2)** The best fundraising time seems to be year's end because people are feeling charitable and give to non-profits. **(3)** Households with incomes below \$20,000 give the most to charity. Next is income levels of \$100,000 and more. **(4)** Giving peaks at 61-75, when 77% of households donate, perhaps having more savings, time, and motivation to help others.

CLOSING:

Katherine Grogan used a PowerPoint to display the lyrics to "The DKG Song" while she played the recorded music. The meeting adjourned at 6:40 p.m.

For instance, (1) one bill requests the revision of the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP); (2) another one states that the state is not liable for any debts or other obligations of a retirement system. Personal Update

One Season to Another

By Marylin Nease, one of a series of personal essays recording my once-a-month caregiving weekends with my older sister

Thirty miles before the end of my non-stop, 194-mile drive from my sunny home in Dallas, Texas, to my older sister's home in Chickasha, Oklahoma, I entered Winter, complete with snow-covered fields as far as I could see on both sides of the highway. When I pulled into her driveway and saw six inches of snow and ice, I thought, "I

should have worn my boots." Then, I noticed someone had shoveled enough of the driveway and sidewalk that if I backed up and re-parked my car, I'd have a safe path into her home. "Thank you," I said to my nephew, though he was no longer on the scene.

Carrying my suitcase from car door to house door, I reveled in the beauty of snow blanketing flowerbeds and trees, transforming them into a personalized winter wonderland. After dark, my sister and I gazed in awe through the windows wrapping three sides of her sun room. The Christmas lights' red, green, blue, white, yellow, orange, and purple made January 1, 2021, a gift; and reflected in the rippling water of the koi pond, the hues multiplied. We looked and looked and still were drawn to the picture beyond the windows.

"My sons worked hard arranging the lights. I'm proud of them!"

"You should leave them up all year, not just during Christmas!"

After we took refuge in the house Saturday and Sunday, shortly after noon on Monday, I carried my suitcase to my car and discovered we'd entered another season.

"Wow, you won't believe how glorious the weather is today after our wintry weekend," I said to my sister. "Let's go outdoors and look at everything! The sun's out, the wind's not blowing, and most of the snow's melted. We can stay on the sidewalks so we don't step into the flowerbeds--they'll be muddy. Want to?"

A lover of outdoors, she needed no persuasion. Soon, she bundled herself into coat, hat, and gloves, stepped onto her outdoor electric scooter, turned the key, and sped ahead down the first sidewalk, exploring and enjoying every sight and sound. I walked behind, enjoying the same sights and sounds, and even more, enjoying her joy.



From Friday to Monday, our world had changed from Winter to sunshine, from snow-blanketed flowerbeds to awakening ones. We stopped at a mahonia bush, drawn by bees that sang and danced gently around its pale green berries. We paused at a bird's song, understanding its happy tune. Here and there, the green tips of spring bulbs emerged. In a flowerbed south of the house, we spotted my sister's first daffodil in bloom, along with two Lenten roses in bud and bloom.

On we wandered through the labyrinth of her gardens, appreciating the natural rhythm of Winter's snow giving life to coming Spring. Always in tune with Nature, my sister blossomed. In the winter of her own life, she understands that harsh Winter is a time of rest that, at its own pace, will give way to Spring's new life.
