Mary Gill shares, "In my early attempt to get a teaching job, I went to DISD for an interview and was told they had a hold on hiring white teachers!

"I turned to longtime close family friend, Lorene Prewitt, for advice. She recommended going to HPISD. I had never even considered going to HPISD thinking there was no way they would hire me! It was suggested that I sign up to substitute, and that is exactly what I did. The next year I had a full-time first grade teaching position.

"A few years into my teaching career, Lorene invited me to attend a DKG meeting. Later, an invitation to join Delta Omicron was extended, and I accepted in 1992! I appreciated the friendships with more experienced teachers, with their stories and advice. I've taken advantage of DKG scholarship opportunities such as applying for and receiving



the Dallas County Coordinating Council's Cora McFarland Scholarship in 2002, and I've held positions on the chapter's executive board, such as treasurer and finance committee. I'm now in my 31st year of DKG!"

MEMBERS REFLECT ON BIRTHDAYS

Margie Rohde shares, "Because my birthday sometimes falls on Mother's Day, my daughter usually plans an outing to celebrate both at once. This year we are going to the Arboretum. My son usually calls from Switzerland to talk and wish me a happy birthday/Mother's Day. My other daughter also calls from Nebraska."



Elenora Asbury reports, "My birth was quite an event in many ways! At the time of my birth, my parents lived in Nashville, TN, but were playing bridge where my mother grew up in nearby Lebanon, TN. They were with my mother's uncle and



his daughter, who was like a fourth sister to my mother. There was a terrible storm, and the power went out when my mother realized that I would be arriving sooner than planned. Phones were out, and my mother realized there wouldn't be time to get to the hospital in Nashville. Fortunately, my Uncle Doc was a doctor who had delivered dozens of babies. Had Uncle Doc not been there, I guess my dad and mother's cousin would have delivered me!

"Everyone rushed to the hospital in Lebanon. Power was still out, but I'm guessing there was a generator at the hospital. This was in 1950. (Yes, I AM that old!) There was a ball game of some kind on the radio, and my dad and uncle both loved sports. While Mother was in labor, Uncle Doc asked my dad to go to the car and check on the score. Supposedly, my mother said if he went, not to come back! I think my dad held a light during the delivery, and mother's cousin also assisted. The rest is history. In 1950 fathers were not welcomed in delivery rooms. I've always told my sister and two brothers that I always knew I was really Dad's favorite because I'm the only child whose birth he witnessed!"

Six guests attended: Dr. Fannie Albert, Liz Garrett, Lisa Gray, Jeanette Rhyan, Cindy Sloan, and Kathy Sutton. Liz Garrett is Area 9 Coordinator for TSO. Jeanette Rhyan was the speaker for the meeting and is a nominee for TSO First Vice President for 2023-2025. Dr. Fannie Albert, Lisa Gray,

Cindy Sloan, and Kathy Sutton are members of Delta Rho Chapter of DKG, which is dissolving. They were visiting our chapter and will consider joining us. Dr. Albert is a technology specialist at Lake Highlands Junior High, Richardson ISD. Lisa Gray is an itinerant vision teacher in Dallas ISD. Cindy Sloan is a retired dyslexia specialist (Mesquite ISD) and will be a presenter at the TSO convention in McAllen in June. Kathy Sutton is a vision teacher in Dallas ISD.

OPENING:

Melanie Rudebeck, Co-President, called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m.

Margaret Arnold, Personal and Professional Enrichment, was absent because of a recent death and illness in her family. In Margaret's place, **Betty Sue Welch gave a brief inspiration**. She reminded



Margie Rohde Recording Secretary members that teamwork is important. **TEAM stands for Together Everyone Achieves More! Melanie** added a quote from Wayne Gretsky, **"You miss 100% of the shots you don't take."**

Margaret Thompson, Second Vice President for Membership, welcomed the visitors from Delta Rho Chapter and asked them to introduce themselves to the members.

PROGRAM:

Denise Barker and Cindy Braley, First Co-Vice Presidents for Programs and Projects, introduced Jeanette Rhyan. Jeanette joined DKG in 1982, has chaired numerous TSO committees, and chaired the committee that planned the 2019 TSO convention in Arlington. She is the nominee for TSO First Vice President for 2023-2025. Jeanette lives in Ft. Worth.



Jeanette spoke on STAR (Spectacular Texas Arts Retreat). She shared that STAR started when three DKG ladies from Texas went to an arts retreat in Illinois. These ladies enjoyed the retreat so much that they asked for space at the Lubbock TSO convention for arts and crafts. The arts and crafts session at the convention was a big success.

TSO's annual STAR is held at Camp Allen, an Episcopal facility located at Navasota, Texas, in the Piney Woods. Jeanette has been attending since 2016. She often is a presenter of crafts. This year she was director of the Saturday night melodrama at STAR, and she will be again in 2024. The cost is now \$250. The retreat starts at 4 p.m. Friday and ends at 2 p.m. Sunday; and for the fee, an attendee gets two nights' lodging, six meals, and all craft supplies. Most sessions last an hour and fifteen minutes. Instructors make the crafts easy for attendees to do. Crafts differ each year. Jeanette shared some crafts she has

made at past retreats. They included a bracelet, a decorated tile, a scissor holder made from a potholder, and a note card decorated with card folding design. STAR will be held next year over Presidents Day weekend, February 16-18.

Jeanette also mentioned that some DKG chapters or areas have their own retreats. Generally, these retreats cost only \$15 and last only one day. Attendees are provided lunch. Often there is a limit of

40-50 attendees for these retreats. **Ft. Worth will host a retreat Oct. 28 from 9 to 3. Houston Area will host a retreat in Galveston in Apr.**

The Women in the Arts Committee of TSO sponsors an art display at the TSO convention. Often these displays showcase students' artwork from nearby schools. The Women in the Arts Committee is also planning a fourdays-and-three nights cruise for 2024. The cruise will leave from Galveston and will feature many arts and crafts activities while on the ship. Jeanette



believes everyone can do crafts. She stated that the STAR retreat often has instructors who come from Illinois to share their knowledge.

Next, led by Denise and Cindy, members made a hand warmer filled with rice and a small amount of lavender. Denise instructed the members to heat the hand warmer in the microwave for 15 seconds before using.

BUSINESS:

- 1.) Betty Sue Welch, Parliamentarian, discussed techniques to use so that everyone can clearly hear during the meeting. She encouraged members to hold up a hand when they want to share something so that one of the co-presidents can call on them, to stand up to speak, and to use their teacher voice. She also discouraged sidebar conversations during the meeting. There were complaints that some members had difficulty hearing at the last meeting.
- 2.) Margaret Thompson, Second Vice President for Membership, announced that Janet Melton, who recently joined the chapter, has decided to step down because of too many family commitments. Margaret encouraged members to tell Janet that she is welcome back to the chapter whenever she feels ready.
- 3.) Wanda Spoonmore and Leesa Cole, Nominations Co-chairs, discussed duties of President and First Vice President. Leesa read many of the duties stated in the DKG International Constitution and printed in the chapter newsletter. Leesa encouraged members to read this section of the newsletter carefully and to consider running for a position. Wanda reminded members that although the president has many duties, she also gets a lot of help from other members. The First Vice President steps in for the President if for some reason she cannot fulfill a responsibility. The First Vice President also is responsible for planning programs and projects.
- 4.) Marta Finlay, Finance Co-chair, gave the treasurer's report. The bank balance as of Feb. 28 was \$3,225.06. Income for Feb. included dues and CCDC Luncheon reservations. Expenses for Feb. included Corresponding Secretary reimbursement and speaker honorarium to ASTEF. Sixteen members have paid for CCDC luncheon. Marta reminded members that dues need to be paid by May 30 and that dues for active members are now \$90. So far, 31 members have rejoined. Dues for reserve members are \$50. \$50 was added to the speaker's fund from members who overpaid dues and did not want their extra \$10 back. Marta will be collecting money and gift cards for ASTEF for the convention through May. She also reminded members to request the reimbursement form from the treasurer and get approval from the president before they can get reimbursed for chapter business expenditures.
- 5.) Kay Keeland, Co-President, briefly discussed both the chapter scholarship and grant-in-aid applications. She encouraged members to consider applying for these awards and offered to help any member who is interested in filling out the forms.
- 6.) Betty Sue Welch asked all Mar. hostesses to stand. Members applauded the hostesses.
- 7.) The Corresponding Secretary read a thank-you note from ASTEF thanking the chapter for its contributions.

CONSTITUTION OF THE DELTA KAPPA GAMMA SOCIETY INTERNATIONAL

Article VI. Officers Section A. Officers 3. Chapter Officers

Chapter officers, all of whom must be members of the Society, shall be a president, a vice president, a secretary (all elected), a treasurer (selected by the executive board), plus the option of a second vice president and/or a corresponding secretary (both elected).

Section C. Duties

2. Vice presidents

b. Second vice president - international (state organizations and chapters optional) The second vice president shall serve as presiding officer in the absence of both the president and the first vice president. In the event of the resignation or death of either the president or the first vice president, she shall succeed to the office of first vice president and serve until the next regular election of officers. The second vice president shall perform such other duties as the president or the executive board shall assign to her.
7. Secretary - The [recording] secretary shall keep minutes of each meeting of the organization and furnish the president with a copy of such minutes. [The corresponding secretary] shall carry on such correspondence as may be delegated to her by the president.



Ni Komang Darmini (Indonesia) will graduate in May with a master's degree (in Reading & Literacy in Early Childhood & the Middle Years) after two years of study at Ohio State University, thanks to a Fulbright scholarship, a DKG World Fellowship (\$4,500), and an OSU scholarship. Darmini told us about her family, her Indonesian culture, and her career goals. Her parents are farmers with basic educations; Darmini is the youngest of eight children; five of the eight are teachers. She said, "Education isn't just about teaching. It also involves nutrition, clothing, and motivating parents to bring their kids to school. Teaching is an act of service coming from the heart." She plans to continue teaching underprivileged children in Indonesia and to work as a university lecturer for other educators.
