Carolyn Miller shares, "I love being in DKG with other educators who are committed to our children and their parents and who want to make our communities and our world a better place for all.

"I've been thinking a lot about how we can work with first-year educators—how to keep them in education. I think education schools are trying to become more practical in their teacher training. I know the Dallas College programs are trying to do that. I often ask myself, 'How can we be guides and helpers to early-career educators?' I remember thinking as a first-year teacher, 'I'm about to drown.'

"Also, teachers are so underpaid. Books are being tossed out! I'm alarmed when I read the newspaper. I wonder 'What can and should I be doing? And, do I really want to spend my retirement mentoring somebody?' Plus, how can a multiple-choice test accurately predict or measure how effective a teacher someone will be or is? I have many questions and concerns.

"I think part of the solution is in the curriculum process at colleges. We have to prepare students for the *real* classroom teaching experience. Yes, future educators need to be prepared to teach the required curriculum, but they *really* need to be prepared to teach the *people* in their classrooms/their students.

"I love being in DKG because these concerns are what we members all think about and want to discuss and find solutions for."





Wanda Spoonmore, Personal and Professional Enrichment, gave the **inspiration on National Pi Day.**was the first to use the Greek letter *Pi* to represent the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its radius. Pi = the circumference of the circle divided by its diameter. No matter how big or little the circle, pi will always be 3.14. Two famous scientists have personal connections with National Pi Day. Albert Einstein was born on March 14, and Stephen Hawking died on March 14. Wanda finished with a joke: "What did one math book say to another? Leave me alone! I've got my own problems!"

PROGRAM:

Elenora Asbury, Co-Vice President for Programs and Projects, introduced
, who are volunteers at Dallas Arboretum.

one or two times a week at the Dallas Arboretum and volunteers at the Perot Museum.

presented "Favorite Plants of Dallas Arboretum." stated that the Arboretum contains 66 acres and is the largest floral display in the Southwest. It has 450,000 bulbs and 500,000 plants on display. He showed pictures of some of the most popular plants. Abelia grows 3-5 feet tall and likes full sun. A popular variety is "Edward Goucher." "Kaleidoscope" is

another abelia variety which only grows 2-3 feet tall but produces fiery colors in the fall. In the spring


and summer, this variety has lime green leaves.

Ligustrum is a low growing hedge and green year-round. recommends the variety "Sunshine."

The "Big series" of begonias are noted for their early bloom, are easy to grow, and like either sun or shade. The "Black Pearl" variety of capsicum produces a lot of heat in its berries, and the berries are hotter than jalapeno peppers. This plant is very colorful and likes full sun. It grows well in zone 8A. stated that watering a plant 24 hours before a freeze will help it withstand the harmful effects of the freeze.

Hollies are popular plants in our area. recommends getting a female holly bush if you want berries, as male plants do not have berries. Nellie R. Stephens variety of holly can grow to 12 feet tall!

Marta asked what plants will **attract hummingbirds**. stated that any plant with a lot of color will work but especially recommended **dogwood or Japanese maple trees**. **Celosia** plants, especially the "Intenz" variety, attracts butterflies and hummingbirds. It likes full sun and blooms all summer.



Coleus plants are low maintenance and will do well in partial sun or shade. Jim recommends the "Wasabi" variety for best results. Cyperus papyrus is a sturdy plant with large, fuzzy poms at the end of its stems. "Prince Tut" is a good variety to purchase. The dichondra plant likes partial shade and is low maintenance. recommends the "Silver Falls" variety. Evolvulus plant grows 30-60 inches tall; "Beach Bum Blue" variety is recommended for best results.

Ipomoea is a sweet potato vine. **Lobelia** is great in pots and is an early blooming plant. **Pelargonium** will only bloom until the weather gets hot. **Lobularia** plants have a wide range of colors. **Zinnia** flowers, especially the "Profusion" series, are resistant to leaf rot. stated that **ornamental millet plants** smell like maple syrup. showed **a variety**

of cherry tomato that has unique color. **Candy cane** plants like full sun; a good variety to purchase is "Sweet Pepper." **Mustard** plants grow fast and are good choices for pots.

mentioned the **Dallas Blooms theme for this year is "Birds in Paradise."** On March 24 from 7 to 9 there will be a food and wine festival at the Dallas Arboretum. **A Tasteful Place is a new garden of edible plants**. In the fall, the Arboretum showcases a lot of gourds in fanciful designs. The Arboretum is especially known for its Christmas at the Arboretum display. That display is best viewed at night. Members enjoyed presentation greatly.

Katherine updated attendees on **members'** health concerns. She mentioned that Sherri Allinder had neck surgery and is in a brace. Kay Keeland shared Vicky Hamilton's situation. She has kidney cancer and is currently living in an apartment while her home, which was damaged

in the October 2019 tornado, is being repaired. Cards would be appreciated, but members are urged to email Vicky first to get her correct address.

Leesa Cole, Treasurer, gave the treasurer's report. Current balance in the bank is \$4,579.37. Eight members have paid their dues. Eighteen members are going to the CCDC luncheon, and their reservations have been paid. A member asked if one could still pay for the luncheon. Leesa stated that the deadline to pay was March 15 and she will send out an email to members about whom to contact. One must register as an individual rather than as a chapter, as the chapter deadline has passed. \$130 was sent to Schools for Africa. Anticipated income for March includes more membership dues. Margaret Thompson, Vice President for Membership, expressed her excitement at having inducted five new members. She continues to work on getting biographical information on all members. She passed out more sheets for members to fill out and return to her.

Kay Keeland, Fellowship Committee Co-Chair, asked if members were ready for another outing to the Dallas Arboretum. There was a lot of interest so Kay plans to schedule a trip to the Arboretum in April. She will send out an email. There will be a **runoff election on May 7, 2022**. Early voting in-person will be from Mon., Apr. 25, 2022, to Tues., May 3, 2022. The candidates who win this May runoff will run in the Nov. Primary. Very few people are voting in elections, so please vote.

"The **68th TRTA Convention** was held Apr. 11-13 in Dallas at the Hilton Anatole. Tim Lee, Executive Director of TRTA, discussed topics that matter most to TRS retirees with State Senator Royce West, Representative Rafael Anchia,

Giovanni Capriglione, and Tony Tinderholt. Topics included how to win a cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) and improve funding for the TRS-Care health insurance program."

The Texas Legislature did not have a regular session in 2022. The legislature meets biennially in odd-numbered years for 140 days. **The next regular TX Legislature session will run from Jan. 10, 2023 - May 29, 2023.** Visit your legislators during this off-session time and talk about your pension, COLA, and TRS-Care. Let them know your situation. Write letters, visit them, and keep it up. Remember **we have very few friends in Austin.**

Some of you may be thinking about retirement, so I have included a few things that might help you. All employees (ACTIVE and RETIRED) of a school system in Texas need to check with TRS to make sure that they are familiar with **death benefits** and how to obtain them. Make sure TRS has your "Death Benefit Form." A death benefit will not go to a funeral home; it will only go to your beneficiary. It can help pay for your funeral or leave a small amount of money to someone special. This is not treated as a life insurance payment; therefore, it is subject to federal income tax. A "Death Benefit" has nothing to with your pension. It is a separate entity. Please click on this link for further information. https://www.trs.texas.gov/Pages/active member death benefits claims.aspx When you start to think about retiring, contact TRS to make sure that you have all the documented paperwork. You may need to make a retirement appointment with your school district or TRS. Make sure you understand the six different tiers for retirement and how you qualify for retirement. The tiers determine your monetary monthly and annual annuity checks. Please click on this link and look at the tiers on page 30. https://www.trs.texas.gov/TRS%20Documents/benefits_handbook.pdf Check "My TRS" on the internet often to make sure there are no mistakes in your account. Computers do make mistakes. Get the most current issue of "Teacher Retirement System of Texas-TRS Benefits Handbook," and read it carefully. Please review this link. https://www.trs.texas.gov/Pages/Homepage.aspx

If possible, **please join Texas Retired Teacher Association (TRTA).** They will keep you up-to-date on education and educator issues. Membership is \$35 a year for state and an additional \$10 for local membership. If you have to choose one, go for \$35 to state. When we talk to legislators, the number of members that we have speaks volumes. Just think, if we had 200 retirees and only 10 joined, that wouldn't look like educators were concerned or cared. **Please join TRTA.**


