
Now, back to the books I've been reading—both with strong female protagonists.

Two weeks ago, I finished *She Would Be King* by Wayétu Moore (published in 2018). The book begins in the early 1800s and takes place in West Africa, Virginia, Jamaica, then West Africa again. It follows three central characters, all of them joining forces in the battle for human freedom. I like that I learned a bit about Liberia's founding and that the tale is about a woman who has enough strength, courage, and wisdom to be king of her village--*but* she is female. Still, she leads the fight for justice, a struggle that continues today. Magical realism is central to the tale: the three main characters have special powers they use for good. The author was born in Liberia, reared in Texas, and is a graduate of Howard University, Columbia University, and the University of Southern California. One of my best friends read the book and passed it on to me. Let me know if you'd like to read it, and I'll pass it on to you.

Last night I finished *The Tall Woman* by Wilma Dykeman (published in 1962)—also passed on to me by the same friend. I *love* this book. It's historical fiction, one of my favorite genres. Set in pre- and post-Civil War time in Virginia, the story follows the life of the oldest daughter of a pioneering family as she comes of age, marries, and rears her own family. She is a strong woman, strong in body, mind, and heart, able to embrace the joys and the challenges of her historical time and place. This beautifully written story contains lots of life wisdom relevant to any era. Again, I'll pass it on to you if you'd like to read it. Just let me know.

Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) are highly trained volunteers appointed by courts to advocate for the best interests of children in child welfare systems because of abuse or neglect at home.

In Area 5, TSO members will be supporting CASA projects in (1) Laredo/Webb County, Voz de Niños; (2) Edinburg/Hidalgo County, CASA of Hidalgo County; (3) Brownsville/Cameron and Willacy Counties, CASA of Cameron and Willacy Counties; (4) Corpus

Christi/Nueces and Aransas Counties, CASA of the Coastal Bend; and **(5)** Kingsville/Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, and Kleberg Counties, Brush Country CASA.

They get many donations for young children, but the older children do not receive as much.
