

Delta Omicron's Annual December Project: Denton State-Supported Living Center—

(1) Some Facts

The Denton campus is **one of thirteen state-supported living centers in Texas.** Texas Health and Human Services operates the thirteen centers. Besides Denton, the locations are Abilene, Austin, Brenham, Corpus Christi, El Paso, Lubbock, Lufkin, Mexia, Richmond, Rio Grande, San Angelo, and San Antonio.

"The living centers provide campus-based direct services and supports to people with intellectual and developmental disabilities....who are medically fragile or who have behavioral problems."

Admissions can be respite, emergency, or regular.

"State-supported living centers provide **24-hour residential services**, comprehensive behavioral-treatment services, and health-care services, including physician services, nursing services, and dental services. Other services include skills training; occupational, physical, and speech therapies; vocational programs; and services to maintain connections between residents and their families and natural support systems."

(2) A Question: *How and when did our annual service project begin?* The answers follow.

Personal Memories: The following research article comes from the December 7, 2013, edition of *The 4:15.*

Every December, Delta Omicron members donate to the Denton State-Supported Living Center. *How did our annual service project begin?*

Dr. Eula Lee Carter and Miss Phyllis Ellis chartered our chapter on May 19, 1956.



Wanda Spoonmore, initiated into Delta Omicron in 1964 and now our president, reports, "I looked back through my chapter yearbooks, and the first time our Denton State School service project is listed is in the 1968-69 book."

Spoonmore adds, "I remember when a radio station began playing a tape of residents stating what they would like for Christmas—a radio community-service that continues today.

"The concert band I play with made annual trips to the Denton State School at Christmas for years. Some of the bandsmen carried sacks of candy

for the residents.

"I recall the first time I played there; John and my mother went with me. It was a very emotional trip for me to observe all the residents: one fellow played his harmonica all the way through every piece. Another fellow always came to the podium and conducted a number we played as though he knew what he was doing musically.

"The entire gym floor of the basketball court was lined with chairs for the residents. Most of the residents were grown men and women, not children, and some were there year after year as we returned. I wondered if they remembered us as we remembered them.

"It has been 25 to 30 years since I was there, but I remember."



Dr. Billie Grissom, a 27-year member of DKG, has a master's and a Ph.D. in special education. She recalls, "Families used to keep their special-needs children at home, locked away from the public's eyes." She says, "It wasn't until the 1950s that this attitude began to change and the state began to provide public school services."

One of these public schools is the DSSLC, which opened in 1960, four years after the chartering of Delta Omicron Chapter.

Today the DSSLC's189-acre facility is home to almost 500 residents. It employs 1,500 workers, serves 18 counties, and is one of 13 such Texas state-supported schools. Yes, it receives state funds, but monetary gifts such as from our chapter allow the DSSLC to better serve its residents.

Though our annual service project's exact origin is unclear, the need to assist the special-needs adults at the DSSLC remains clear, and our chapter's members continue to give to this worthy cause each December.

Legislation Committee

The 87th Texas Legislature will be in session January 12, 2021-May 31, 2021. Remember we vote again in the March Primary.

Now would be a great opportunity to talk with your legislators and discuss TRS-Care and our pension plan.

TRS has still not revealed how much money they plan to take out of the Texas Teachers Pension Fund for their offices in the new Indeed Tower, and for the

operating expenses for the London and possible Singapore TRS offices.

Tim Lee, Executive Director of Texas Retired Teachers (TRTA), will speak at the Dallas Retired Teachers meeting on Friday, January 10, 2020, at 10:00 a.m. This will be at the Meadows Conference Center, 2900 Live Oak Street, Dallas, TX 75204. You do not have to be a member to attend.

Scholarship Committee - Scholarship vs. Grant-in-Aid?

Many members ask what the difference is between a scholarship and a grant-in-aid. For reporting purposes scholarships are awarded to Delta Kappa Gamma members, and grants-in-aid are awarded to non-members. Chapters and state organizations can call them whatever they choose, keeping in mind how it is reported each year.

Grants-in-aid and scholarships are awarded at all levels of the Society. At the international level the Scholarship Committee awards \$10,000 to qualifying members pursuing a PhD and \$6,000 to qualifying members pursuing an advanced degree. At the international level, grants-in-aid are awarded by the World Fellowship Committee to non-members attending a college or university in the United States or an approved university in Canada. State organizations give scholarships to qualifying members working on degrees, receiving special training, professional development or grants-in-aid to non-members in either high school or college. Many chapters give scholarships to qualifying members furthering their education and grants-in-aid to non-members in high school or college.

At the international convention in Austin in 2018, the convention attendees voted to amend the governing documents of the Society so that scholarship fees paid annually by members go to the state organization and to the chapter, if the chapter has a scholarship fund. A portion of the scholarship fee is no longer part of the revenue for the DKG International Scholarship Fund. Funding for international scholarships comes from contributions, beguests, and income from investments.

International, state organizations, and chapters advertise their grants-in-aid and scholarships through their newsletters, websites, social media, and personal contacts. Members and state organizations are encouraged to give donations and bequests to the DKG International Scholarship Fund. Most importantly, both grants-in-aid and scholarships support the vision of DKG, "Leading Women Educators Impacting Education Worldwide." (source: DKGSI online)

HPISD names Dr. Jaime Callahan Director of Accountability and Assessment



Jaime Callahan, Ed.D., has been named the Director of Accountability and Assessment for Highland Park ISD.

Jaime Callahan, Ed.D., has been named the Director of Accountability and Assessment for Highland Park ISD.

Dr. Callahan has served as the District's Curriculum Specialist and ESL Coordinator since August 2018, after working as a STEAM Instructional and Design Coach during the 2017-18 school year.

In her new role, Dr. Callahan will oversee testing services and accountability for the district. She will implement state and federally mandated student assessment programs and collaborate with staff to analyze and interpret results to identify student performance trends and improve student learning.

"I am thrilled to begin serving the district in this capacity," Dr. Callahan said. "My role is to ensure that we are performing well relative to state testing standards; however, my goal is also to make sure we are investing in our students' growth. It's not just about passing a test but about making sure our students are equipped with the tools they need to be successful after graduation in an ever-evolving world."

Dr. Callahan joined MIS in 2006 as a fifth-grade science teacher, then moved to HPMS to teach eighth-grade science. Before her time in HPISD, she taught sixth-grade math and science in Irving ISD.

In 2016, Dr. Callahan published the article "Encouraging Retention of New Teachers Through Mentoring Strategies" in the Delta Kappa Gamma Bulletin, a peer-reviewed academic journal. She was later honored for her article with the 2016-17 Member in Print Award by The Texas State Organization and Delta Omicron Chapter of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International.

"With Dr. Callahan's immense talent and experience in HPISD, she will provide outstanding assessment and accountability support for our campuses," Assistant Superintendent for Education Services Lisa Wilson said.

Dr. Callahan holds a Doctorate of Educational Leadership from Dallas Baptist University, a Master of Education from Southern Methodist University and a Bachelor of Science from Texas State University.

In her spare time, Dr. Callahan enjoys spending time with her husband taking care of their 15-year-old dog, Buzz, running marathons and climbing tall mountains.




