Part 1: December 12, 2016 Oh. to Be...

Back when I was teaching high school English classes, occasionally I'd hear a student long for the easier days of childhood. Now sometimes on Facebook, I read a post from one of my former students remarking about the pains of

"adulting."

Lately, I'm relating to their urges to go back in time.

No, I don't want to go back to childhood. I've always felt happy at each stage of my life. However, at the moment I'd love to go back to the innocence of a couple of months ago, say to November. Or, to last August or June. Or, to last April. Back to any of those times in 2016 when my three sisters and I convened in Oklahoma to clean my older sister garage or carport or storage sheds or home's upstairs. We sisters, along with other family members, worked hard sorting through more than two decades of acquiring and storing. Each time we ended up dirty and weary on our way to restoring order and function. Sometimes we sisters gathered around kitchen table for a meal of oven-roasted vegetables from her garden or from her vounger son's garden. I knew I was having a good time being with family then, even in the midst of the labor and sweat.

But I didn't know how good those times were until December. Not until I learned that my youngest sister has cancer.

Oh, to be innocent again. To live in our sisterhood's happygo-lucky, pre-cancer days.

An Uncertain Future

So, what now?

The best I've figured out so far is that we have to carry on as before, the best we can, with interruptions for doctor appointments and medical procedures. In between the interruptions, and especially during them, we must live in the present moment, sharing love and laughter and life in whatever it is we're doing at the time.

Nothing can change-because everything has changed with the loss of our innocence.

What lies ahead we sisters do not know.

A Shared Past

All we know is about our past. We grew up sharing one bedroom, reared by parents who taught us about family and responsibility, about education and vision.

And through the decades, we've remained a tightly knit group of four by making time to get together at holidays and family dinners, at sister weekends and family reunions.

We're in our 60s and 70s today, still feeling young inside but now vulnerable, too.

A Present to Share

And all we can do is live in our shared present.

Every time my younger sister and I carpool from Texas to Oklahoma for visits with medical appointments, we'll talk and drive, talk and drive, as always, looking forward to the four of us being together again.

When we're together, we'll celebrate and make more memories, ones that will sweeten the future, even as we think, "Oh, to be innocent again."

Part 2: January 6, 2017 In a Ditch

Suddenly the scene began to spin; that meant we were spinning. We'd been driving north. Now we spun to the south. Next, we spun to the north again. Then, we spun to the east and headed straight down a 60 degree embankment 20 or so feet before spinning to face south again and coming to an abrupt and welcome stop.

"Is everybody okay?" asked my nephew from the front passenger's seat.

The other four of us answered affirmatively that we were. In the driver's seat sat my nephew-in-law, **Constant**. In the back seat of the four-wheel-drive Dodge Ram pickup, I sat behind the driver, my younger sister **Constant** sat in the middle, and my older sister **Constant** sat behind the passenger.

We'd been on our way to a medical facility in Oklahoma City, where our youngest sister was scheduled for a biopsy.

The night before, snow had fallen, leaving a winter wonderland for us to admire the next morning. While we watched from kitchen windows, a light snow continued to fall. Several times we remarked on the beauty before us.

A little later, we were on the road heading to OKC. Snowplows and salt trucks had done their work before us, and the highway surface was drivable—until we hit that slick spot and spun out of control.

Despite best efforts, the pickup couldn't climb the snow-covered incline to take us back to the highway, where we'd be able to resume our trip. Our only way out of the ditch was to call a towing service. An hour later, we cheered the sight of a tow truck, which needed multiple tries to pull us up the slick, steep incline. Only later, when wrote the name of the towing service on a check, did we note its name: Bad Day Towing. We enjoyed the chuckle, knowing our trip into the ditch could have been so much worse.

We arrived at the hospital an hour and a half late, but safe and sound. We'd have to wait to see her until she was in recovery. But that was okay because now at least our day was back in order again.

Except that it wasn't. Not since that day in December when received the phone call that told her she has cancer—and by extension we have cancer. Cancer is *our* cancer, *family*'s cancer.

Like that Dodge truck traveling smoothly along until it hit that unexpected slick spot and spun out of control, our lives were playing out in their normal daily routines until that phone call, that cancer, sent us all flying into a ditch. A ditch of shocks and questions, of fears and worries.

If only we could pick up a phone, call Bad Day Towing, be pulled out of our ditch, and resume our family's journey, just as it was before.

Part 3: January 17, 2017 Third Door on the Left

A medical attendant leads the nine of us down the hall to the third door on the left. Four sisters, a husband, a son, a daughter-in-law, and two nephews arrange ourselves around the examination room. We make small talk.

Soon an oncologist arrives for the preliminary conversation, and then a second oncologist for the main conversation. Opening the door, each smiles, wide-eyed, at our group's number. We've set a record, we learn.

tells **box**, and us by extension, in a straightforward and compassionate manner that the cancer is lung cancer and incurable. He uses diagrams to show where it has metastasized. He talks about available treatments, all palliative. He is informative, kind, often funny. We listen, soaking in his words, appreciating his skill and manner, enjoying the chance to laugh.

When would be would be a state of the patient, joins in the humor. When would be would be would be a state of the patient of t

Hand raised, grins impishly at him, before saying, "I am."

Incurable.

I don't know that any of us prior to the meeting fully admits to ourselves that we'll be hearing that word.

Except **Except**. She responds to **prognosis** with poise and dignity, grace and humor, saying, "It is what it is." Hearing about a clinical trial her particular lung cancer might qualify for, she says, "I want to do it if I can. To help others."

Earlier at home, most of us have studied the PET scan and accompanying text written in "medicalese." We know the situation is not good, that it is, in fact, ominous,

Still, don't we all hope until doom's confirmed? "Hope springs eternal ... " and all? (Alexander Pope, "An Essay on Man," 1734)

Afterward, when the medical meeting and talking are over, we reassemble at a nearby restaurant for a meal and fellowship before driving back to our four separate homes around the state. Before we say goodbye, my older sister leads the nine of us in joining hands and expressing to each other our gratitude and love for our family.

And now it begins-the "what next"?

it's immediately ten rounds of radiation to her right For femur to prevent its breaking. Then, it will be more meetings and more information about the possibility of additional radiation, smart pills, immunotherapy, a clinical trial, chemotherapy, and so on. She'll have many decisions to make.

For the rest of us, it's what can we do for ? We begin with a housekeeper, fresh flowers delivered weekly, a supply of good books, a laptop loaded with decades of family photos, spring blooming bulbs, irrigation maintenance, deck replacement, a ramp, frequent visits, talk of a road trip, and on and on. We make plans to pack twenty years into one.

TUTORING TUESDAYS! By Marylin Nease Tuesday, February 7, 2017

Tutee #1 – My first tutee is a fourthgrade girl. As we walk upstairs, I ask her about her day. "Bad," she replies.

"The whole day?" "Yes!"

"There must have been something good about your day." "No, and I don't want to read."

I enter the office to sign in. A teacher comes in and asks me whether I'm volunteering with _____ today. I answer yes. He tells me she's hiding under the table in the hall.

"You might play along a little before you find her," he urges. In the hall I ask a student, "Have you seen ____? I don't know where she went."

He points under the table.

"Oh, there you are!"

Immediately she slides from under the table, and we head down the hall. Her whining continues.

I tell her what I used to do with my high school students when they occasionally had a whining mood: "I told them that they had one minute to complain and whine and gripe, that I was setting a timer, and that I wanted to hear them whine loudly. After that we were going on with our lesson, and I didn't want to hear any more whining." After she and I get to our classroom and seat ourselves, she whines again about "having to read."

I say, "No, you *get* to read. There's a difference in *getting to* do something and *having to* do it. Okay, I'm setting the timer for one minute. Let me hear you whine!"

Told to whine, she never measures up solo in volume and creativity to a classroom of high school kids. Still, she gets my message.

She opens a book from the *Mercy Watson* series; she's selected it from her teacher's desk. I set the timer for 20 minutes. I ask whether she wants to take turns with me reading every other page.

"No, I want to read every page."

"Excellent!"

And she begins. ©

Reading is not easy for her, but I hear solid progress from when we began our partnership last October. I am pleased, and I encourage her along her journey through the words and sentences, paragraphs and pages.

"How much longer do I have?"

"Let's check the timer."

When she sees eleven minutes, she's surprised and thrilled that she's read almost half her time. And that's the first time today she's asked, "Are we there yet?" ^(C)

She returns to reading, and before long 20 minutes are up.

Finished, she says, "Bye!" and hops out of her chair to leave. I remind her about saying thank-you and putting her book and chair away.

She puts her book and chair where they belong, and we thank each other. She heads off to play, and I go in search of my next tutee.

Tutee #2 – My next tutee volunteers. Hooray! She's a seventh-grade girl, and this is our first time to work together.

Her book is *Too Many Dogs*. I ask her to catch me up on the first 20 pages she's already read. She does, and off we go—with the timer set for 30 minutes. She's a good reader; she and the level of the book seem well matched. She usually figures out unknown words on her own, using the skills she's learning at Hillier. Now and then, we stop to discuss the story, making sure she's comprehending. She seems to be.

Our story presents two enterprising, sixth-grade girls who want to earn money. They establish a dog-walking business, complete with business cards. Successful, they give \$80 to the frozen custard store owner to use when their friends come in for treats. *Generous girls!*

Two of their Chill shop friends are boys, and one of the girls shares their business plan with one of the boys and gives him a card. A few days later, the two boys and the two girls meet in the neighborhood, each pair walking dogs. And the competition is on!

Before our timer sounds, I ask my tutee how she's doing. She's starting to wilt, but we have less than a minute remaining of our 30 minutes. I ask her to predict who's going to win the competition.

"The girls!" is her immediate response. I love her spirit. She asks me to sign her reading log and thanks me for reading with her. We say our goodbyes, and she heads off to play outside. I drive home, thinking about the wonders of reading—how kids go about solving its puzzle, and how teachers offer tools and encourage progress. Meaningful teamwork, it seems to me.


