Unable to attend were Kay Keeland, Special Projects Committee Chair; Marylin Nease, Communications and Publicity Committee Chair; and Julie Turnbow, Parliamentarian.

Katherine Grogan called the meeting to order at 10:45 p. m.

Katherine announced that we can **resume meetings at Highland Park Presbyterian Church** in room K on the second floor, providing all members wear masks except when they are eating.

PROGRAMS:

Elenora briefly discussed the remaining programs for the coming year:

- **a.) - e.) Elenora plans to send a \$25 donation to

OPENING:

Katherine Grogan called the meeting to order at 5:07 p.m.

PROGRAM:

Elenora Asbury, Co-Vice President for Programs and Projects, **introduced Joyanne Burger and her program, A Nurse's Heart for Women's Health**.

(3.) Katherine stated that the Coordinating Council of Dallas County (CCDC) Luncheon will be April 9. It will be held at Prestonwood Country Club, a new location. Members need to pay for the luncheon by March 8. Leesa is taking checks for the luncheon. Katherine volunteered our chapter to work as greeters and needs volunteers. Katherine mentioned that there will be a silent auction and suggested that members could donate gift cards to put in the chapter's

present, but Katherine will share these concerns with her so she can send cards to members.

(4.) Margaret Thompson, 2nd Vice President for Membership, stated that five new members will be inducted in March. She is also ordering name badges for anyone who wants one. The chapter pays for name badges for the new members, but existing members must pay \$15. Margaret plans to update biographical information on every member and put the information in a

notebook. She suggested that the chapter update member information every few years. She handed out sheets to some members and plans to email more copies to members.

- (5.) Lou McMillan, Nominations Committee Chair, reported Leesa Cole has agreed to continue as Treasurer (an appointed position) while Kay Keeland and Melanie Rudebeck are nominees for the position of president for the next two years. She encouraged members to think about what positions they might be willing to accept either as an officer or as a committee chair. Every member must accept a placement on a committee. The Nominations Committee consists of Barbara Clinton, Leesa Cole, Melanie Rudebeck, and Wanda Spoonmore.
- (6.) Leesa Cole, Treasurer and Scholarship Committee Chair, briefly gave a treasurer's report. The bank balance is slightly over \$3,900, and the full report can be read in the newsletter, p. 14. She also encouraged members to read closely the information on p. 11 of the newsletter about scholarship options. The Cora McFarland scholarship has a March 1 deadline, while two local chapter options, one a scholarship and the other a grant-in-aid, have April 1 deadlines. Leesa encouraged members to make donations to ASTEF this month. Members can donate in honor of someone who has been important in their life, and the people honored will be posted at the convention in Lubbock in June.
- (7.) Marta Finlay and Mary Gill, Finance Committee Co-Chairs, reminded members that dues should be paid by May. Leesa stated that she is willing to take one check for both membership and the CCDC Luncheon. The finance committee will begin phone calls in May to members who have not paid by that time.
- (8.) Grace Delatour and Carolyn Miller, Past Chapter Presidents, presented a report on DKG International's project Supporting Early-career Educators (SEE), which began in 2012. They shared that 10% of teachers leave after 1 year, 33% after 3 years, and 46% after 5 years, so support of early-career educators is much needed. While many teachers leave because of a move or for family and personal reasons, 50% of educators polled stated that they want more independence in doing their job. Grace and Carolyn also shared what schools the chapter has helped in the recent past. For three years, the chapter used ASTEF grants to obtain equipment for the Hillier School, held teacher luncheons, and tutored after school. Last year.

- the chapter supported **Vogel Alcove**, and this year members are supporting **West Dallas Community School**.
- (9.) Mary Carol Hughes, Global Awareness Committee member, presented a report on **DKG**International's project Schools for Africa (SFA). The goals are to provide funds for quality education for girls, orphans, and other vulnerable children in sub-Saharan Africa and for building and supplying schools with equipment like desks and books. SFA also helps with sanitation, educates about hygiene, and trains teachers. **Members can donate by writing a**check to UNICEF, which has longstanding relationships with officials and organizations in Africa.
 Mary Carol mentioned that Audrey Hepburn was a longtime UNICEF Goodwill Ambassador working in Africa. DKG members have donated \$445,000 since 2010, when SFA began. **The Girl**with a Louding Voice, written by a Nigerian author, is an excellent book to read to get a greater picture about the needs in Africa.
- (10.) Legislation Committee Chair, was not present but sent the message via Katherine that everyone should vote.

ADJOURNMENT:

Door prizes were won by Delores Bates, Mary Gill, , and the **DKG song**. Katherine **adjourned** the meeting at 6:28 p.m.



LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE, by Chair

TRTA'S GOALS, MEMBERS' ROLES

The Texas Retired Teachers Association (TRTA) works closely with the Texas Legislature and U.S. Congress to preserve and maintain the Texas Retirement System (TRS) pension fund and TRS-Care insurance plan for all Texas educators.

Preserve TRS Texas Traditional Defined Benefit Retirement Plan.

Approximately 95 percent of public-school employees do not participate in Social Security. This saves taxpayers billions of dollars, but also raises the stakes when ensuring the TRS traditional defined benefit is strong and viable for future retirees.

Fund TRS Pension Trust, which will ensure the long-term solvency of TRS. TRTA members urge the 88th Texas Legislature to continue the plan by introducing and adopting a state budget that funds the contribution rates of 8.25 percent for the state and active educators and 1.9 percent for school districts by 2024. **TRTA urges the enactment of a cost-of-living adjustment (COLA)** for TRS retirees as an emergency item in the coming session.

Protect TRS-Care for the future. TRTA thinks the best solution for this issue is to design and implement a long-term plan that continuously reviews health care costs and associated state funding and compares them to the actual costs of health care.
