

After-school Tutoring

Lou McMillan reports, I cannot believe it's been three years since I began my tutoring with some of the most dedicated and delightful students I have ever had the pleasure of teaching.

I have tutored students of different ages, different levels, and different interests.

But, one common denominator is found in all of them. They all have a diagnosed learning difference, and they all are so appreciative of anyone who cares enough to help them reach their greatest potential.

This past month I have worked mainly with a first grader and a second grader who are new to Hillier. They both are severely dyslexic and smart as they can be. We read for 15-20 minutes; then, we talk about what we have been reading. With children who have special needs in language, they need more work on comprehension than those who have no challenges.

Also, I try to get in an extra 15 minutes with some of my former students whose skills have shown good improvement. They are getting close to graduating and naturally are apprehensive.

Hillier School is a wonderful setting of encouragement and nurturing for all of their students and especially for preparing each child to be ready when it's time "to move on."

Tuesday, March 20, 2018

Tutee #1 - 5th Grader
A Dog Called Kitty

Laughter means comprehension!

This tutee and I greet each other with a hug. My husband's surgery and her spring break have kept us apart for two Tuesdays.

We review where we left off in the novel. Then, we take turns reading.

I love hearing my tutee laugh because I hear her delight; I love her laughter, too, because it tells me she's engaged and comprehending the plot's humor! Yes! ©

Tutee #2 - 2nd Grader

Jed's Bag / Is It Matt? / Tam Has a Nap / Sim and the Bat / Ned. the Cat / The Thing on the Path / The Big Hill

Gives me so many smiles!

This tutee is so engaged with the plot of *Tam Has a Nap* that he warns Tam: "Uh, oh, turn it [the water] off! Oh, no, it's flooding your house! Get out!"

Also, when our 20-minute timer sounds, he wants to keep reading, so we do—three more books!

Plus, he checks the library card in each of his selected books, and for one book he exults, "I'm the first one to read this book!"

In all, he reads seven books today, his most ever! ©

Tutee #3 – 3rd Grader

Is It Matt? / Tam Has a Nap / The Thing on the Path / Ned, the Cat / The Big Hill / Sam and the Bat / Ned Is Bad / The Old Lamp / Chips for Lunch / Drum Sticks

So proud of my tutee!

At first, this tutee wants to read for only 10 minutes, so I set the timer, and we start reading. She determines the book she selected is too difficult.

She chooses another book and insists I reset the timer for 20 minutes. She reads five six-page books; then, she asks me, "Do you know how to count by sixes?" I tell her I do, and we determine she's already read 30 pages!

She chooses five more books to read—until she's read 10 books, 60 pages, and 25 minutes! Hooray! ☺

Tuesday, April 3, 2018

I missed last Tuesday because I was taking my husband to our doctor. Today when I arrive, three students greet me, wanting to read. Hooray! ©

Tutee #1 – 3rd **Grader** Dora Helps Diego

"Can I read first?"

This tutee, for the first time ever, asks to be first. I'm thrilled at her interest today.

She reads to me my first-ever Dora-adventure book. Then, she asks to read it again and does so!

Afterward, we have a few minutes left in our 20 minutes, so we start a retelling of the Little Red Riding Hood tale. ©

Tutee #2 - 5th Grader

Ferocious Girls, Steamroller Boys, and Other Poems in Between (by Timothy Bush) / A Dog Called Kitty

Yay for poetry!

I am delighted when my next tutee pulls out a book of poetry. I love poetry and enjoy hearing her read each poem; I hear her taking delight in the words, repetitions, and rhythms! Ferocious is difficult to pronounce, but by the end of the poem, she's got it!

We have time left in our 30 minutes, so we turn to our ongoing novel. We take turns reading seven pages in chapter 11. Dad's away helping his sister, whose family was in a car

accident, so Ricky and his mom are taking care of the farm. Their challenges? A snow storm, a truck stuck in mud, and two cows delivering calves!

Tutee #3 - 2nd Grader

The Glum Cat / Jed Swims / A Wish

"Yes, I want to read!"

This tutee wants to read and takes a 15-minute break from his playground time to do so. Wow!

He selects three new books from a series he's enjoyed before.

Tuesday, April 10, 2018

Tutee #1 – 5th Grader
A Dog Called Kittty

"Another book of poetry?"

I ask my tutee whether she has brought another book of poetry for us to read. When she says no, we decide to return to our ongoing novel. Again, we take turns reading— worrying and frightened when Ricky and Kitty find that the missing heifer has delivered her calf and now all four face a pack of wild dogs.

Tutee #2 - 5th Grader

Black Beauty / Fun in the Hills / Ned Is Bad / Is It Matt? / A Wish / Kip's Bad Leg / Jed's Bag / Tam Has a Nap / Ned, the Cat / Hot Sun / The Glum Cat / Jed Swims

"May I read?"

This tutee surprises me when she asks to read. We haven't read together since last school year. I tell her, "Of course! Do you have a book?" She selects *Black Beauty*. I tell her I loved that book when I was her age. I ask how long she wants to read, and she says, "20 minutes."

And so, we begin on page one. Her reading has improved, and I hear her using phonics. After several pages, I ask her who the narrator is. She looks on the front of the book and tells me the author's name. I say, "No, it's Black Beauty; the horse is talking to us." With a look of wonder, she begins reading again.

When our 20 minutes are up, she wants to read 20 more minutes but in a different book. She chooses *Fun in the Hills*, closer to her comfortable reading level.

Then, she asks to read 10 more minutes, and this time she selects 10 books and reads for fluency.

I praise her often today, pleased with how she has matured. At the end of our 50 minutes, she takes photos of the books she's read, returns them to the library bookcase, and closes the cabinet. I walk her to the playground; then, I head to my car, happy with her progress. ©

Tuesday, April 17, 2018

Tutee #1 - 5th Grader

The Lost House

"Something's not right!"

When I ask my tutee whether she already has a book for us to read, she says yes and shows me one from her language arts teacher. I ask her to fill me in on the part she's already read, and she does: the main character, a 13-year-old girl, wants to be on the soccer team.

As my tutee and I take turns reading, we discover she needs \$700 to pay the soccer fee, so she and a friend in the same boat talk with their parents and brainstorm ways to earn money.

Their first job is to clean a long vacant, two-story house rumored to be haunted. A real estate agent is ready to sell it and will pay the girls the \$700 they need.

Sounds perfect, except...when the girls get to work, they experience strange things. For example, when our 20 minutes are up, we've just looked over the girls' shoulders to see snow falling in the backyard in the middle of summer!

Tutee #2 – 3rd Grader

I Love My Mami / Puppy Takes a Bath / Dora and the Baby Crab

"Dora the Explorer saves our day!"

My tutee has trouble finding a book she wants to read. I spot a Dora book, and she immediately agrees.

We read two Dora books and are partway into a third when our 10 minutes are up.

Thank you, Dora, for encouraging this tutee to read! ☺

Tutee #3 – 5th Grader Moon Dogs Series

"Can I read for 50 minutes again?"

When I hear this tutee has requested to read with me again this week, I'm pleased.

She asks for 50 minutes, and I set the timer. We begin with reading two phonics worksheets she's completed in her just-finished tutoring session with her language arts teacher.

Next, she selects a stack of books in the Moon Dogs Series. Each is six pages of fluency reading for



her. She completes nine of the books in her stack in the 12 minutes we have before her mother arrives to take her home.

She, her mother, her language arts teacher, and I are delighted at her progress! Hooray! ☺

Tuesday, April 24, 2018

Tutee #1 – 3rd Grader

Dora and the Rainbow Kite Festival

"Dora continues to engage!"

When my tutee and I search for books at her reading level, she once again chooses a Dora book, and we both enjoy the book.

The story, the brightly colored illustrations, and the author's other devices, such as occasionally substituting pictures for words, and directing questions to the reader: "Can you find the seven keys for the seven locks?"—all of these engage my tutee during our 20-minute session. ©

Tutee #2 - 2nd Grader

I'm a Frog / Let's Go for a Drive

"Becoming Piggie and Elephant is fun!"

My tutee bought three books in the school's book fair today, and we read two of them (57 pages in each one) in our 20-minute session. He suggests we take on the parts of the main characters, Piggie and Elephant.

So, when Piggie pretends to be a frog, we "ribbit!" and when Elephant pretends to be a cow, we "moo-ooo!" And we read the rest of our characters' parts to move the story along.

Likewise, we read as Piggie and Elephant in the second book, where we make careful plans for a trip—until we realize, oops, we have no car to drive.

What fun we have reading these two books!

Tuesday, May 1, 2018

Tutee #1 - 5th Grader

A Dog Called Kitty

"Determined!"

My tutee and I count the remaining pages in our book: we have 25 left. We are determined to finish this book before the school year ends. Using her fingers and mine, we add up our total read during our 30 minutes. We read 16 pages today—9 in chapter 13 and 7 in chapter 14!

Tutee #2 - 3rd Grader

Puppy Takes a Bath / Wrong Way Reggie

"That's my mom's name!"

We find another Dora book, and in it we bathe a puppy. Then, we look for another book and can't find one my tutee wants to read until she spots the name someone has written on the cover. "Hey, that's my mom's name!" She puzzles over how it came to be there. Who knows? But, the name hooks her into wanting to read Wrong Way Reggie, a fun book about a directionally challenged penguin. Motivation to read comes from unexpected sources! ©

Tuesday, May 8, 2018

Tutee #1 - 5th Grader

A Dog Called Kitty

"The end!"

Today my tutee and I finish reading this 14-chapter, 153page book—A Dog Called Kitty by Bill Wallace. We've been reading a few pages each week for several months. Wow! We did it! ©

Tutee #2 – 3rd Grader

Follow Those Feet! / Dora Helps Diego

"Dora to the rescue again!"

My tutee and I settle on Dora books and end up having fun at the end of a school day and year. I read the words, and she reads the pictured words. Our reading partnership and rhythm make our 20 minutes fun as we help Dora succeed in her missions. © ◆







