Opening:

At 5:00 p.m. **Lou McMillan**, president, welcomed members and quests.

Elenora Asbury, Personal and Professional Enrichment Committee member, shared a meaningful inspiration about kindness.

Lou asked whether there were any corrections or additions to the September minutes. There were none, so the minutes stand approved as printed in the October newsletter.

Mary Gill, treasurer, reported \$4,800 in the chapter account. She also said that 3/4 of the members have already paid this year's membership dues. There were no questions about the report; hence, the treasurer's report will be filed for audit. Mary also reminded members to watch for an email with information about the November 13 initiation dinner and be

ready to mail a check by the deadline to reserve a place.

New Business

Wanda Spoonmore, Fundraising Committee chair, read an appreciation note received from TSO regarding our September gift to the Hurricane Harvey Action Plan. She also encouraged members to shop and buy member-donated books, CDs, and DVDs to support our October fundraiser for ASTEF.

There is a change in location and hostess for the chapter's Christmas gathering. **Eleanora Asbury** will be hosting the Christmas Brunch from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, December 9. December hostesses will provide food; however, anyone else who would like to bring food is welcome to do so. Members should let **Sherrie Negrete** or **Kay Keeland** know if they will bring something and what it will be.

Jamie Callahan, second vice president, introduced Cindy Braley, recommended for membership by Denise Barker, and Mai Gile, recommended for membership by Sherrie Negrete. Cindy and Mai left the room so voting could take place. Members voted unanimously in favor of extending an invitation to DKG membership to these two educators.

Old Business

Wanda Spoonmore reported on results of the September meeting's fundraiser, which supplemented money that members voted to give from the chapter treasury to TSO's Hurricane Harvey Action Plan.

Becky Quigley, Hillier Project chair, discussed ways members can help with the Hillier Project.

Program:

Leah Black, standing in for our program chair, introduced our speaker, State Representative Morgan Meyer, who represents District 108 in the Texas House of Representatives. Meyer's district encompasses Downtown Dallas, Uptown Dallas, East Dallas (including the M Streets and Lower Greenville), Preston Hollow, University Park, and Highland Park. In his second term, Morgan serves on the State Affairs Committee and Public Education Committee.

Among the education topics Rep. Meyer discussed with Delta Omicron members were bills he authored, joint-authored, co-authored, or co-sponsored. These bills related to the use of school district buildings as polling place locations, the prosecution of the offense of improper relationship between educator and student, a limitation on the amount of school property tax revenue that is subject to recapture under the public school finance system, and certain requirements imposed on a sex offender who enters the premises of a school.

In response to a question about how best to meet with and be heard by legislators, Meyer said that being heard and having an impact on proposed legislation is largely about being present but not necessarily in one large group on one occasion. Instead, he urged showing up multiple times to see your representative in Austin or in his/her district, and being persistent. He said legislators do listen and are swayed by constituents' contacts.

The meeting closed with members singing "The Delta Kappa Gamma Song."◆

Part 8: September 23, 2017 Meaningful Work

"Last time I had an appointment with Dr. he asked me why I'm still working," my sister who has cancer, tells me.

We're in her kitchen. She's testing eggs for freshness, and I'm making cookie dough. We're talking while everyone else is in the living room watching OSU/TCU football on TV.

I tell her, "I remember years ago when one of my coworkers had cancer, she chose to keep working. She wore a chemo pump on her hip and worked almost until she died."

I add, "I know you said early on that you don't know what you'd do with your time if you weren't working. Do you still feel that way? Does working at the bank still feel meaningful?"

She hesitates, then answers, her voice cracking a bit, "After my diagnosis, when I talked with my boss, about quitting or continuing to work, I told him I know I'm not at my

best. He told me, '50% from you is better than 100% from other people."

"That's quite a compliment. How he feels must mean a lot to you. Are there other things about the bank that make working feel meaningful?" I ask.

She tells me about opportunities to mentor younger workers, not only in banking but also in maturing and making good choices.

I learn of a young woman uncertain about a relationship and about a career. The girl told her friends were advising her to break up. They'd also told her to go into banking instead of teaching because she could make more money.

listened and then asked, "What do you want to do?"
The young woman said she wanted to teach. So, she sat down at so computer and looked up the closest college to research what courses she would need to take and whether she could work at the bank while taking some of them online to get her degree started.

told her, "You're taking off work tomorrow."

The next day the girl and her mother went to the college and enrolled her. She broke up with the boy, too. She's in school and working, and Luna remains her bank supervisor and her mentor.

tells me about another young woman she's mentored through rough patches at work. Recently, after seeing enough signs of maturity, assigned her to supervise the bank's drive-through employees. That move has eased work load and is offering the young employee more opportunities to grow.

Remembering my years of mentoring high school students, I tell her, "What you're doing sounds meaningful and satisfying. That has to feel good. And you're making a difference in your employees' lives, too."

"Let's go rest awhile," urges, and I follow her into the living room, where we catch up on the game. We're a mixed family, some rooting for OSU, and some for TCU. No matter; being together is all we need for now.

On October 31, I sent copies of our chapter yearbook to the required TSO leaders.


Soon after, Charlotte Nyman, TSO Yearbook Committee chair, emailed me that our chapter has received the Early Bird Award for submitting our yearbook

Between September 25 and October 2, my husband and I visited our son who lives in Virginia.

Monticello

I enjoyed a day trip to Thomas Jefferson's home, Monticello.

I found it fascinating to see what a person's home can tell about the owner. JFK once told a room full of scientists at the White House, "This must be the most brilliant collection of intelligent brain power to ever be dining at the White House except for when Thomas Jefferson dined alone."

West Point

Later in the week our son joined us on a trip to NYC and to West Point. It was a fantastic three-hour tour of the U.S. Military Academy. I highly recommend it.

I did have one unexpected inspiration. We learned the story of two spinster sisters who lived on an island in the Hudson River across from West Point. These sisters, Susan and Anna Warner, taught Sunday school lessons to the cadets at chapel services. They also wrote short stories and sold them to make a living. In 1860 the sisters wrote a fiction story about a very sick boy. The boy asked a kind man

visiting him to sing a song. These are the words that Anna wrote for the man to sing to the boy:

Jesus loves me. This I know, for the Bible tells me so. Little ones to him belong. They are weak, but he is strong....

The sisters sold the story and made a small amount of money, but the copyright laws were not enforced, so they did not benefit as much as they should have. The song was published all over the world. At the end of their lives, the sisters donated the very valuable island to West Point. The women are buried in the West Point Cemetery.

I've always loved this song but had no clue about its origin.

Jean Wallace reports, "A Gentleman in Moscow by Armor Towles is a book I enjoyed recently. In 1922, the Bolsheviks sentence a Russian aristocrat, Count Rostov, to 30 years of house arrest in the Metropol Hotel. Characters come and go in the hotel, and all move the plot along, with Russian history affecting each. I loved

the ending.

"I also recently read my first David Baldacci book, *The Fix.* Detective Amos Decker witnesses a murder outside the FBI building, and the reader is hooked till the end. I loved the short chapters, which made me read the next."



Mai Gile shares, "I just finished Evicted by Matthew Desmond, and I thought it would be a great book about poverty and profit in America today. It changed my mind about poor people, Section 8 housing, and homelessness. It's not an easy book to read because it's wrenching but also eye-opening for all of us. We

know very little about how hard poor people struggle to have a roof over their heads and how damaging it is for their children when they have no stability in their lives."
