Rose-Mary recently celebrated her 90th birthday! Rose-Mary's **topic was "Humanity Faces Calamity – How the Brain Works and the Epidemic of Pain Pills."** Rose-Mary was especially happy to see Dr. Dawna Walsh, her former student and her colleague in teaching "Introduction to Fine Arts" for several years at Dallas Baptist University. Their course included theater and all the other performing arts, as well as the visual arts. Rose-Mary initially discussed her adventures with letters to the editor of *Dallas Morning News*. She also **talked about**

her PhD dissertation on the history of Dallas ISD, later made into a book called *A Century of Class*. She discussed several **facts about the human brain**. Men and women have differences in their brains. People are not right brained or left brained. Everyone uses all parts of their brain, not just 10% as some



think. Getting enough sleep and eating a good diet help the brain work better. Important foods to eat include fish, broccoli, and berries. Chocolate is especially good for the brain. Isolation is bad for the brain. Rose-Mary admitted that many people become a little befuddled as they get older, but she stated that complaining never helps. She also stated that she feels no one is more holy than a teacher. Teachers must accept all students without complaint and work with what they have. As always, members thoroughly enjoyed Rose-Mary's talk.

Anticipated expenses include chapter donation to Cora McFarland Scholarship Fund, chapter fee to CCDC, president's reimbursement for Zoom account, and honorarium to our speaker. Bank signatures have been updated to add Kay Keeland as a signer and remove Katherine Grogan. Bank statements were converted to paperless to avoid monthly fee. Form 15, the annual treasurer's report, has been filed with TSO headquarters. 990n ePostcard annual filing has been submitted to the IRS.

- 3. Marta Finlay, Finance Committee co-chair, reported that the Finance Committee met Aug. 6 to form the proposed budget. 
