



Although her main employment was public school music at University Park Elementary School in Highland Park ISD, where also gave of her time and talents to teach the adults she encountered. The November 6 election is probably the **MOST** important election for public schools and educators. It

seems that many members of the Texas Legislature belong to PACs that want to

- run schools as a business,
- take away educators' rights and healthcare, and
- change our defined benefit plan to a defined contribution plan (401k).

A 401k has hidden fees and commissions, which will most likely drain your money. It is based on the Stock Market, and you may never know the exact amount of your monthly annuity. The 401k money will not go into our current retirement fund, and with the loss of this money, our defined benefit plan will probably start to dry up.

After Texas Legislators serve eight years (working 140 days every other year), they most likely are eligible for a defined benefit plan, which is based on a state judge's salary and a formula. They also qualify for free healthcare for the rest of their lives and may receive Social Security.

Please, vote and stand up for your rights.

STEAM Instructional Coach named HPISD Curriculum Specialist and ESL Coordinator



Jaime Callahan, Ed.D., is Highland Park ISD's Curriculum Specialist and ESL Coordinator, after serving as a STEAM Instructional and Design Coach during the 2017-18 school year.

Dr. Callahan will now coordinate the district's program for English as a Second Language (ESL) for students in grades K-12. She will also lead HPISD teachers to improve student learning

through curriculum, instruction, assessment and professional development.

Dr. Callahan joined MIS in 2006 as a fifth-grade science teacher, then moved to HPMS to teach eighth-grade science. Prior to her time in the district, she taught sixth-grade math and science at Irving ISD.

In 2016, Dr. Callahan published the article "Encouraging Retention of New Teachers Through Mentoring Strategies" in the *Delta Kappa Gamma Bulletin*, a peer-reviewed academic journal. She was later honored for her article with the 2016-17 Member in Print Award by The Texas State Organization and Delta Omicron Chapter of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International.

Dr. Callahan holds a Doctorate of Educational Leadership from Dallas Baptist University, a Master of Education from Southern Methodist University and a Bachelor of Science from Texas State University.

Jaime's update: The second TSO 3-hour Scholarship was awarded to me to help offset the cost of a course I took this

Because I obtained my doctorate, I am eligible to sit for my superintendent certification exam. In order to sit for the superintendent exam, however, one must be certified as a principal, and I was not. I was able to complete my requirements this summer and have obtained my principal certification. I am now eligible to prepare for and take the superintendent certification exam, which I will pursue this fall.

Guest speakers included Dean Leah Teague of the Baylor University School of Law, metalworker Jimmy Don Holmes of the TV series *Fixer Upper*, International DKG Representative June Bowers, and motivational speaker and author Wendy Corbett.

More than 20 breakout sessions provided participants with cutting-edge knowledge on communications/technology, educational excellence, empowering women, legislative advocacy, leadership, and much more.






Carolyn Power reports, "Of the three DKG International Conventions I have attended, the keynote speakers this time were by far the best ever. Don't get me wrong. International keynote speakers are always fantastic. These were uniquely gifted. Benjamin Zander, conducts the Boston Philharmonic Orchestra. The

convention program said, 'He inspires.' That was an understatement. Naida Lopez, principal of what had been the lowest performing school in New York City, told of her journey to improve scores and lives.

"Proposed amendments to the Constitution and International Standing Rules were the heart of the week. We were 2,000 women with different points of view, yet we basically agreed on almost all issues.

Penni Lewis shares, "Besides the usual things that make for a good convention, I especially enjoyed meeting some ladies from Japan at Thursday morning's Southwest Regional breakfast and then going to a program they were involved with about a doll sharing project started before WWII between students in the US and Japan.



"Atsuko Ando's breakout session was titled 'The Blue-eyed Doll: An Ambassador of Peace.' Atsuko said she wanted everyone to 'learn the beautiful story of blue-eyed friendship dolls sent to Japan by an American missionary in 1926 to foster peace between Japan and America.' Atsuko added, 'I wanted to share this poignant story with DKG sisters around the world to develop understanding and appreciation of getting along globally and to spark conversations of peace and goodwill.'" ◆



Carolyn Miller reports, "Here is my summary of what I think our members would most like to know about revisions to the DKG Constitution and International Standing Rules:

(1) We are still DKG. However, we may only be referred to by our geographic names. For example, we are no longer Alpha State. We are Texas.

(2) The financial year has changed. It is now July 1-June 30. This means that we will have to pay dues for this year now and then again in the spring. Leesa Cole has an idea to make this easier.
(3) College students majoring in education may become members, although they may not hold offices until they are employed in the profession." ◆
