
"DKG is one of my favorite activities! Through the years I've been in several groups that I've stayed with, and it's always because of the people who will help you if you need anything."

#### **OPENING:**

Katherine Grogan, President, called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m.

Wanda Spoonmore, Personal and Professional Enrichment Committee chair, gave the inspiration on Dr. Annie Webb Blanton, Founder of DKG on May 11, 1929. Wanda shared Annie's words from one of her books: "Everything that helps to wear away age-old prejudices contributes toward the advancement of women and of humanity."



#### **PROGRAM:**


**1. Carolyn Miller,** Necrology Committee chair, remembered member Vicky Hamilton, who died May 1, 2022. Carolyn stated that Vicky represented all that DKG stands for and that her life will be reflected in our memories of Vicky.

Wanda Spoonmore, a longtime friend and colleague, shared a moving summary of Vicky's life. First, Wanda recalled Vicky's May 6 funeral at North Cities Pentecostal Church, which was led by four ministers, including one who was her nephew. Wanda said, most of all, Vicky was dedicated to her career as a seventh-grade math teacher. She always arrived early and stayed late so that her students could receive tutoring. Vicky taught for 43 years and was teacher of the year

in the late 1990s. Wanda stated that Vicky always had her back, and she always had Vicky's.

Wanda recalled attending Vicky's wedding and visiting her in the hospital two years later when Vicky's son was born. Wanda and Vicky ate out often. They took an SMU summer course together. Wanda stated that Vicky was not a "fair weather friend," and many members of her church, family, and professional life came to the visitation on Thursday night, May 5, and expressed how much Vicky meant to them.





2. Katherine Grogan, President; Susan Bell, Ceremonies Committee member; and Marylin Nease, Communications and Publicity Committee chair, presented a talk on the 12 Founders of DKG. Dr. Annie Webb Blanton, founded DKG with the goals of supporting women educators, encouraging excellence in education, and improving working conditions. She was the first woman president of the Texas State Teachers Association and in 1918 was elected the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. DKG was her dream, and the organization grew thanks to her drive. Dr. Blanton lived from August 1870 to October 1945. The eleven other Founders include Mamie Sue Bastian, Ruby Cole, Mabel Grizzard, Dr. Anna Hiss, Ray King, Sue King, Dr. Helen Koch, Ruby Terrill Lomax, Dr. Cora M. Martin, Lalla M. Odom, and Lela Lee Williams. Founders' bios and photos



3. Margaret Arnold, Ceremonies Committee member, recognized members of our chapter who've served as president of a DKG chapter. **4. Katherine Grogan recognized 50+ year members**. Wanda Spoonmore was present, and Jean Wallace attended via Zoom. Cindy Braley took a picture. Unable to attend were Janet Cundiff and Shirley Kochman.



5. Margaret Arnold, Achievement Awards Committee member, announced the Chapter Achievement Award for 2020-22. Katherine Grogan received the award for her leadership and commitment to the chapter during the years of the pandemic.

6. Liza Leggett, Ceremonies Committee chair, shared some history of Delta Omicron in honor of the chapter's 66<sup>th</sup> birthday. Delta Omicron was chartered in Dallas on May 19, 1956. The chapter was organized by Dr. Eula Lee Carter and Miss Phyllis Ellis. Dr. Carter was an honorary DKG Founder, TSO President from 1934 to 1938, and TSO Secretary from 1936 to 1950. Miss Ellis was TSO President and Southwest Regional Director from 1948 to 1950 and TSO Secretary from 1950 to 1978.

7. Penni Lewis, Music Committee chair, played "Happy Birthday" on her flute, and members sang "Happy Birthday" to

Delta Omicron Chapter. Kay Keeland cut the birthday cake and served members with



assistance from the May hostesses.

8. Katherine Grogan recognized the 2020-22 Executive Board: Elenora Asbury and Kathy Rodriguez, Co-First Vice Presidents for Programs and Projects; Margaret Thompson, 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President for Membership; Margie Rohde,

Melanie, having served as president before, already has a president's pin.



#### **REPORTS FROM OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES:**

1. The minutes were approved as amended and printed in the newsletter.

2. Leesa Cole, Treasurer, gave the treasurer's report. She reminded new officers and committee chairs that they are expected to attend the Area 9 Workshop in September 2022. The cost of the workshop is \$12 if paid by May 30 and \$15 after May 30. She also mentioned that she had submitted Vicky Hamilton's name to TSO so that she could be honored at the June convention in Lubbock during the Celebration of Life ceremony. Income for March included 27 paid memberships and one Schools for Africa contribution. The bank balance for March 31, 2022, was \$5,673.01. There were 18 paid reservations to the CCDC Luncheon. Expenses in March included Area 9 Workshop chapter fee, reimbursement of the president for memorial flowers, and a memorial contribution to ASTEF. The Schools for Africa contribution and the CCDC reservations were in and out. Anticipated income for April, May, and June included more membership dues and Area 9 Workshop registrations. Anticipated expenses for April, May, and June included more membership dues to International and TSO, convention stipend of \$250 to be split among members attending the convention, reimbursement of chapter presidents for state convention, reimbursement of corresponding secretary for mailings, and reimbursement of chapter presidents for international convention. Leesa asked members to notify her if they are registered to attend the state convention in June.

3. Katherine asked if there were any illnesses that needed to be mentioned. Wanda Spoonmore stated that Marylin

Nease mentioned that **Sara Coleman** is now home from the hospital and is doing better.


